

Understanding the printer's features and benefits

Congratulations on the purchase of your new product. The HP LaserJet 1200 series provides the following benefits.

Print with excellent quality

- Print 1200 dots per inch.
- PCL-5e, PCL-6, and Postscript Level 2 emulation are already installed on the printer.
- The printer automatically determines and switches to the appropriate language for the print job.

Save Time

- Fast printing at 15 pages per minute (ppm) for letter size pages and 14 ppm for A4 size pages.
- No waiting. The first page is out in less than 10 seconds.

Save money

- Use EconoMode to save toner.
- Print multiple pages on a single sheet of paper (N-up printing).

Create professional documents

- Use watermarks, such as Confidential, to protect your documents.
- Print booklets. You can use this feature to easily print the pages in the order required to create cards or books. Once printed, all you have to do is fold and staple the pages.
- Print the first page on different media than the rest of the pages.







Printer control panel

The printer control panel is comprised of two lights and one lighted button. These lights produce patterns that identify your printer's status.



- Go button and light: To print a configuration page or to continue printing while in manual feed mode, press and release the Go button.
- Ready light: Indicates that the printer is ready to print.
- Attention light: Indicates printer media input tray is empty, toner door is open, toner cartridge is missing, or other errors.

Note

See Printer light patterns for a description of the light patterns.

Printer input trays

Main input tray

The enclosed main input tray, located in front of the printer, holds up to 250 sheets of 20 lb paper, multiple envelopes, or other media.

Priority input tray

You should use the priority input tray when feeding up to 10 sheets of 20 lb paper or when printing single envelopes, postcards, labels, or transparencies. You can also use the priority input tray to print the first page on different media than the rest of the document.




Note

The printer automatically prints from the priority input tray before printing from the main input tray.

Printer media guides


Both input trays have side media guides. The main input tray also has a rear media guide. Media guides ensure that the media is correctly fed into the printer and that the print is not skewed (crooked on the media). When loading media, adjust the media guides to match the width and length of the media that you are using.



Printer output paths


Output bin

The output bin is located on the top of the printer. Printed media is collected here in the correct sequence when the straight-through output door is closed. Use the output bin when printing normal and large, collated documents.



Straight-through output path

The straight-through output path is useful when you are printing envelopes, transparencies, heavy media, or any media that tends to curl when printed. Printed media exits in reverse order when the straight-through output door is open.



Note


Printed media does not stack when you use the straight-through output path. The media drops to the surface below unless you remove each sheet as it exits the printer.

Toner door

The toner door is located on the front of the printer. You must open the toner door to access the toner cartridge, clear jams, and clean the printer. To open the toner door, firmly grasp the left and right sides and pull the toner door toward you.

Note

You will feel some resistance when opening the toner door. Opening the toner door conveniently lifts the toner cartridge for easy removal.



Choosing paper and other media

HP LaserJet printers produce excellent print quality documents. You can print on a variety of media, such as paper (including up to 100% recycled fiber content paper), envelopes, labels, transparencies, and custom-sized media. The following are the supported media sizes:

• **Minimum:** 76 by 127 mm (3 by 5 in.)

• **Maximum:** 216 by 356 mm (8.5 by 14 in.)

Properties such as weight, grain, and moisture content are important factors that affect printer performance and quality. To achieve the best possible print quality, only use high-quality media designed for laser printers. See Printer media specifications for detailed paper and media specifications.

Note

Always test a sample of the media before you purchase large quantities. Your media supplier should understand the requirements specified in the *Guidelines for Paper and Other Print Media* (HP part number 5963-7863). See Printer media specifications for more information.

Loading media into the input trays

Main input tray

The main input tray holds up to 250 pages of 20 lb paper or fewer pages of heavier media (25 mm or less stack). Load media with the top forward and the side to be printed facing up. To prevent jams and skewing, always adjust the side and rear media guides.

Priority input tray

The priority input tray holds up to 10 pages of 20 lb paper or one envelope, transparency, or card. Load media with the top forward and the side to be printed facing up. To prevent jams and skewing, always adjust the side media guides.

CAUTION

If you try to print on media that is wrinkled, folded, or damaged in any way, a jam might occur. See <u>Printer media specifications</u> for more information.

Note

When you add new media, make sure that you remove all of the media from the input tray and straighten the stack of new media. This helps prevent multiple sheets of media from feeding through the printer at one time, reducing media jams.

Specific types of media


- Transparencies and labels: Load transparencies and labels with the top forward and the side to be printed facing up. See <u>Printing transparencies and labels</u> for more information.
- Envelopes: Load envelopes with the narrow, stamp side forward and the side to be printed facing up. See <u>Printing</u> <u>envelopes</u> for more information.
- Letterhead or preprinted forms: Load with the top forward and the side to be printed facing up. See <u>Printing letterhead</u> or <u>preprinted forms</u> for more information.
- Cards and custom-sized media: Load with the narrow side forward and the side to be printed facing up. See <u>Printing</u> <u>custom-sized media or cardstock</u> for more information.

Turning the power off

If the printer requires 110-127 volts of power, you must unplug the printer to turn the power off. If the printer requires 220-240 volts, you can switch the printer off (the switch is located on the left side of the power plug) or unplug it.

WARNING!

To ensure safety when working inside the printer for any reason, unplug the printer.



Understanding voltage conversions

Because of the different specifications, Hewlett-Packard does not offer a voltage conversion or support the voltage conversion of the U.S. version of the HP LaserJet family of printers for foreign use. If you plan on using the equipment outside of the United States, Hewlett-Packard advises you to purchase the products in the country/region where you will use them.

CAUTION

Check your printer's voltage requirement before you plug it in. Printers that require 110-127 volts of power will not work with 220-240 voltage outlets.

Accessing the printer properties (driver) and help

This section provides information on the following topics:

- Printer properties (driver)
- Printer online help

Printer properties (driver)

Printer properties control the printer. You can change the default settings, such as media size and type, printing on both sides of the paper (manual duplexing), printing multiple pages on a single sheet of paper (N-up printing), resolution, and watermarks. You can access the printer properties in the following ways:

- Through the software application that you are using to print.
 This only changes the settings for the current software application.
- Through the Windows[®] operating system. This changes the default settings for all future print jobs.

Note

Because many software applications use a different method of accessing the printer properties, the following section describes the most common methods used in Windows 9x, 2000, Millennium, NT^{\otimes} 4.0, and Mac OS.

Windows 9x, 2000, Millennium, and NT 4.0

- Change the settings for the current software application:
 From within the software application, click File, Print, and Properties. (Although the steps can vary between software applications, this is the most common method.)
- Change the default settings for all future print jobs: Click Start in the Windows system tray, Settings, and Printers.
 Right-click the printer icon that you want to change, and click Properties. (Many of the features in Windows NT are also in the Document Defaults menu.)

Software For Macintosh Computers

PostScript Printer Description Files (PPDs)

PPDs, in combination with the LaserWriter 8 driver, access the printer features and allow the computer to communicate with the printer. An installation program for the PPDs is provided on the HP LaserJet 1200 Series CD.

Accessing the print driver

- 1 From the Apple menu, select the Chooser.
- Click the LaserWriter icon.
- 3 Click the HP LaserJet 1200 Series icon.
- 4 Click **Setup** to make changes to the printer's settings.

Note

If you use the LaserWriter 8 print driver, you will lose scanner capabilities.

HP LaserJet Utility

HP LaserJet Utility allows control over features that are not available in the driver. The illustrated screens make selecting printer features from the Macintosh computer easier than ever. Use the HP LaserJet Utility to do the following:

- Name the printer, assign it to a zone on the network, download files and fonts, and change most of the printer settings. See the HP LaserJet Utility help.
- From the computer, lock out functions on the printer to prevent unauthorized access.

Printer online help

Printer properties online help

The printer properties (driver) online help includes specific information about the functions in the printer properties. This online help guides you through the process of changing your printer's default settings.

To access the printer properties help system, open the printer properties and click **Help**.

Printo Copyo Scan Online help

The HP LaserJet 1220 online help includes information for all of the printing, copying, and scanning software applications.


To access the HP LaserJet 1220 online help, use any of the following methods:

- Program Group in Windows 9x and NT 4.0: Click Start,
 Programs, HP LaserJet 1220, and LaserJet 1220 Online Help.
- HP LaserJet Director: Click the right mouse button on the HP LaserJet Director toolbar then select Help from the context menu.
- LaserJet Document Manager: Click Help from the main menu.
- Mac OS: Turn on Balloon help.

Printing a configuration page

Among other items, the configuration page provides all of the printer configuration settings, verification that the scanner is attached, a sample of the print quality, and information about the printer's page counts. You can also use the configuration page to verify that the printer is printing correctly.

To print a configuration page while the printer is in the Ready state, press and release the **Go** button on the printer control panel.





 - · Reduce or enlarge
 - Adjust the contrast
 - · Set the copy quality
 - Make color copies by sending them to a color printer



Copier/scanner control panel

The copier/scanner control panel is comprised of two buttons.



- **Copy:** To perform Quick Copies, even if your computer is powered off, press the **Copy** button.
- **Scan:** To launch HP LaserJet Director, press the **Scan** button. If HP LaserJet Director is configured correctly, you can perform the following tasks:
 - Scan to e-mail
 - Store documents electronically
 - Edit text (Optical Character Recognition)
 - · Make multiple and customized copies

Note


To cancel a scan or copy job from the control panel, simultaneously press both buttons.

Media input tray, guides, and output bin

The media input tray (1) is located on the front, top side of the scanner. The media guides (2), which are located on the media input tray, ensure that the media is correctly fed into the scanner and prevent skewing (crooked image). The output bin (3) is below the media input tray.


CAUTION

If the media is not loaded correctly, the media might jam and the original that you are scanning or copying might be damaged. See <u>Loading</u> <u>originals in the copier/scanner</u> for more information.



Copier/scanner door

The copier/scanner door is located on the top of the copier/scanner. You must open the copier/scanner door to remove jams or clean the copier/scanner. To release the latch and open the door, press the button located on the right side, and gently grasp the door and rotate it open. To close the door, rotate the door until it clicks.



Supported media sizes and types

The copier/scanner for the HP LaserJet 1220 printer can handle a broader range of media sizes and types than the printer itself can. The following are the supported media sizes:

• Minimum: 50.8 by 90 mm (2 by 3.5 in.)

• **Maximum:** 216 by 762 mm (8.5 by 35 in.)

In addition, you can scan and copy many different types of media that are typically not used for printing, such as newsprint, photographs, business receipts, and business cards.

Note

You must use a carrier sheet to feed small or delicate originals, such as newsprint, through the copier/scanner without causing a jam. To make a carrier sheet, use a piece of paper and a transparency, tape the leading edges together, and load your original between the sheets.

Note

You must feed business cards and any media that is smaller than 76.2 by 127 mm (3 by 5 in.) to the straight-through output path. You can also tape them to the leading edge of a carrier sheet and feed them to the straight-through output bin.

See <u>Precautions for copying and scanning</u> for more information.

Precautions for copying and scanning

You should not put anything in the copier/scanner that might jam or damage the feed mechanism. To minimize the possibility of jamming or damaging the feed mechanism, observe the following precautions:

- Remove self-stick notes.
- Remove staples and paper clips.
- Straighten any curls or wrinkles in the original that you are scanning.
- Feed irregularly sized originals one at a time.
- Do not scan or copy any original with glue, correction fluid, or wet ink on it.
- Do not scan or copy gummed-backed paper, labels, or originals.
- Do no scan or copy originals that have tears, perforations, or any defect that might cause a jam.
- Do not scan originals that are larger or smaller than the supported size. See <u>Supported media sizes and types</u> for more information.

Note	You must use a carrier sheet to feed small or delicate originals, such as newsprint, through the copier/scanner without causing a jam. To make a carrier sheet, use a piece of paper and a transparency, tape the leading edges together, and load your original between the sheets.
Note	You must feed business cards and any media that is smaller than 76.2 by 127 mm (3 by 5 in.) to the straight-through output path. You can use a carrier sheet and feed them to the straight-through output bin.
Note	To obtain good results, it is important that you use the correct resolution and color settings for your job. See <u>Scanner resolution and color</u> for more information.

Loading originals in the copier/scanner

To load originals in the copier/scanner


- 1 Load the original with the side to be scanned facing up. If you are using the straight-through output path, load business cards with the long side forward. See Precautions for copying and scanning for more information.
- 2 Adjust the media guides.
- 3 Press the Scan button on the scanner or press the Copy button for a Quick Copy.

Note

When you add new originals, always remove the originals from the input tray and straighten the stack.

CAUTION

Small originals will cause a jam if they are not loaded correctly.



Note

If you are editing text (OCR), you must load the original with the text positioned horizontally and upside down. See <u>Editing scanned text</u> (Optical Character Recognition) for more information.

Getting to know the software

HP LaserJet Director (Windows 98, 2000, Millennium, NT 4.0, and Mac OS)

Note

HP LaserJet Director is not available under Windows 95.

HP LaserJet Director is a quick and convenient desktop tool palette that you can use to facilitate many of your routine office tasks, including the following:

- Copying
- Storing or managing scanned text and images
- Scanning to e-mail
- Editing scanned text (OCR)

Accessing HP LaserJet Director (Windows)

- 1 In the Windows system tray, click **Start**.
- 2 Click Programs.
- 3 Click HP LaserJet 1220 Series.
- 4 Click HP LaserJet Director.
- 5 An HP icon appears in the Windows system tray. To display HP LaserJet Director on your computer screen, click the HP icon.

Accessing HP LaserJet Director (Mac OS)

1 From the desktop, double-click the HP LaserJet Director icon.

To turn off the HP LaserJet Director

Use the following steps to close the HP LaserJet Director.

Windows

- 1 Open the HP LaserJet Director.
- 2 Click the right mouse button on the toolbar.
- 3 Select Exit from the context menu.

Note

To restart the HP LaserJet Director after turning it off, click **Start**, point to **Programs**, point to **HP LaserJet 1220**, and then click **HP LaserJet Director**.

Mac OS

- 1 Open the HP LaserJet Director.
- 2 From the File menu, select Quit.

Note

To restart the HP LaserJet Director after turning it off, double-click the alias on the desktop.

HP LaserJet Document Manager (Windows 98, 2000, Millennium, NT 4.0, and Mac OS)

Note

HP LaserJet Document Manager is not available under Windows 95.

HP LaserJet Document Manager (Windows) and HP WorkPlace (Macintosh) is a full-featured desktop application for the scanning and copying capabilities of the HP LaserJet 1220. From HP LaserJet Document Manager, you can perform the following tasks and more:

- Copy
- Scan images (or acquire an image from a TWAIN-compliant device)
- Store and manage scanned images and all of your documents
- Send scanned images and documents to your fax (you must install a fax software application on your computer)

You can print (electronically) to HP LaserJet Document Manager from any software application. You can use this feature to access any of the functions within HP LaserJet Document Manager from the documents that you create in your favorite desktop publishing or word processing application, saving you the time it takes to first print and then scan a hard copy version. The online help provides more information about HP LaserJet Document Manager. See Accessing the online help.

Understanding the print server's features and benefits

If you purchased an HP JetDirect 175X with your HP LaserJet 1200 printer, you can perform the following tasks:

- Enhance workgroup productivity by placing your printer at a convenient location on the network while improving network printer performance.
- Connect your printer directly to the network.
- Share scan and print functions with others on the network.

Note

You can only attach one printer to the print server. Do not use a USB hub to attach more than one printer.

Using network protocols

The HP JetDirect 175X supports the following protocols:

- TCP/IP (Transmission Control Protocol/Internet Protocol)
- IPX/SPX (Internetwork Packet Exchange)
- AppleTalk


Note

IPX/SPX is not supported on Novell networks. You must configure the HP JetDirect print server for a direct peer-to-peer connection from the computer to the device rather than through a Novell server. This is sometimes called IPX direct mode.

If you are setting up client-server printing on a Microsoft Windows 95, 98, NT, or 2000 network, you can use the installation software to configure your Windows 95, 98, NT, or 2000 print server and then share the printer with client computers.

If you are setting up peer-to-peer printing on a Microsoft Windows 95, 98, NT, or 2000 network, you can use the installation software to configure each client to print directly to the printer.


Identifying the print server's components



Installing the print server

The HP JetDirect 175X has a single USB port and an RJ-45 network port (10Base-T or 100Base-T) for connecting to a network. The following items are included with your HP JetDirect 175X:

- Power module
- Clip (attached to server)
- USB cable



To install the HP JetDirect 175X hardware

- 1 Use a network cable to connect the 175X to the network.
- 2 Use the USB cable to connect the 175X to your printer.
- 3 Attach the power module to the print server.
- 4 Plug the module's power cord into a power receptacle.
- 5 The 10 and 100 LED should be green, indicating that there is a network connection. The power/status LED should begin blinking. Within 15 seconds the power/status LED should be solid green.
- 6 To print a configuration page and verify the printer connection, press the **Test** button.
- 7 Use the optional clip to physically attach the print server to the back of your printer or any convenient location.

Installing and configuring the network software

The installation program on the printer CD-ROM provides the easiest and fastest way to set up your print server, along with your printer.

The CD-ROM contains software, documentation, and registration for your print server as well as your printer. Using this information, you can perform the following tasks:

- Quickly install the print server software
- View documentation for your print server
- Register your print server via the Internet

For additional options, see the appropriate sections in this chapter.

Install the software on a network

The installation program on the CD-ROM guides you through the basic configuration of your print server, along with your printer.

Note

If you purchased a print server separately, make sure that you install the print server using the software found on the CD-ROM that came with your printer. Do not use the HP JetDirect CD-ROM that came with your print server. If you have already installed the printer using the "Direct Connect" option, you must uninstall the printer software and run the printer software again, using the "Connected to the network" option, to ensure that all print, copy, and scan features function properly.

Install the printer and server

- 1 Quit all open applications.
- Insert the CD-ROM into the CD-ROM drive. When the welcome screen displays, follow the directions on the screen. When asked how the printer will be connected, select Connected to the network, and click Next.

Note

If the welcome screen does not display, click **Start**, and **Run**. Type x:setup (where x is the letter of your CD-ROM drive), and click **OK**. If it does not display in Macintosh, double-click the CD icon in the desktop, then double-click **HP AlI-In-One Installer**.

When the installation is nearly complete, a setup screen appears that asks if you want to print a test page. Click Yes.

Note

If you purchased a print server separately, make sure that you install the print server software found on the CD-ROM that came with your printer. Reinstall the printer software to ensure that all print, copy, and scan features function properly.

If your network uses the TCP/IP protocol, you can use additional tools to customize the print server's configuration for your network environment.

Using the embedded web server

Each HP JetDirect 175X print server contains an embedded web server that you can access through a compatible web browser on an intranet. The embedded web server provides access to configuration and management pages for the print server and the attached printer. The networking pages provide access to status and configuration information on the HP JetDirect 175X print server.

You can use the embedded web server to perform the following tasks:

- Monitor the status of the printer and the print server
- Make optional configuration changes for the print server to customize it for your network
- Link to HP's Web site
- Scan images over the network without HP LaserJet 1220 software

Prerequisites

Computers with the TCP/IP protocol installed can use the embedded web server to monitor and configure the printers networked with an HP JetDirect print server. Use the installation program on the printer CD-ROM to set this up.

Before you can use the embedded web server, you must configure an IP address for the HP JetDirect print server. Use the installation program on the printer CD-ROM to configure the IP address.

Optionally, you can use BootP (Bootstrap Protocol) or DHCP (Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol) to *automatically* configure the IP address over the network each time the print server is turned on.

Compatible Web Browsers

If you use Windows 9x, 2000, Millennium, or NT 4.0, the embedded web server works with the following browsers:

- Netscape Navigator 4.6x, 4.7, 4.71, and 4.72
- Internet Explorer 4.0, 4.01 with SP2, 5.0, and 5.01 (Millennium requires IE 5.0 or greater)

For the latest list of compatible web browsers, check HP's Customer Care online at http://www.hp.com/support/net_printing.

Starting the embedded web server

After you establish an IP address on the print server, perform the following steps:

- 1 Run a supported web browser.
- 2 Enter the IP address of the print server as the URL. The print server's Home page displays.
- 3 Click the **Help** link on the web page for more information.

Note

If you change the IP address and other parameters, the connection to the embedded web server closes. To re-establish a connection, use the new IP address as the URL. Also, some computer setups may no longer work.

Using HP Web JetAdmin

HP Web JetAdmin is a printer installation and management application for intranets. You can obtain this software from HP Customer Care Online at

http://www.hp.com/support/net_printing.

Hewlett-Packard recommends that you use HP Web JetAdmin version 6.0 or later for operation with the print server's embedded web server.

Additional configuration and management tools

The rest of this chapter includes information about other network configurations that you can use to attach your HP LaserJet 1200 or 1220 series product to a network.

Using BOOTP

This section describes how to configure the print server using Bootstrap Protocol (BOOTP) services on servers in some operating systems. You use BOOTP to download network configuration data from a server to the HP JetDirect print server over the network.

Note

On Windows NT and 2000 server systems, use the Microsoft DHCP utilities to set up HP JetDirect configuration via BOOTP. See <u>Using</u> DHCP for more information.

Benefits of using BOOTP

Using BOOTP to download configuration data provides the following benefits:

- Enhanced configuration control of the HP JetDirect print server. If you use other methods, such as the printer control panel, the configuration is limited to select parameters.
- Ease of configuration management. You can have the network configuration parameters for the entire network in one location.
- Ease of HP JetDirect print server configuration. You can automatically download complete network configuration information each time you turn the print server on.

The factory default for the HP JetDirect print server is to operate through BOOTP.

Configuring the BOOTP server

Note

Hewlett-Packard recommends that the BOOTP server be located on the same subnet as the printers it serves. Routers cannot forward BOOTP broadcast packets unless the routers are properly configured.

Note

If the HP JetDirect print server does not receive its IP configuration within two minutes, a default IP address is automatically assigned: 192.0.0.192. You are advised not to leave this address as it is, but to change it to an address that fits into your network addressing scheme. You can, however, use this address to initially access the print server, and then change it to a more suitable one. To use the default IP address temporarily, set up your computer with an IP address in the same subnet, or establish an IP route to it.

For the HP JetDirect print server to obtain its configuration data over the network, you must set up the BOOTP servers with the appropriate configuration files. The print server uses BOOTP to obtain entries in the /etc/bootptab file on a BOOTP server.

When you turn the HP JetDirect print server on, it broadcasts a BOOTP request that contains its hardware address. A BOOTP server daemon searches the /etc/bootptab file for a matching MAC address and, if successful, sends the corresponding configuration data to the HP JetDirect print server as a BOOTP reply. The configuration data in the /etc/bootptab file must be properly entered. See Bootptab file entries for a description of the entries.

CAUTION

Community names (passwords) for your printer are not secure. If you specify a community name for your printer, select a name that is different from the passwords used for other systems on your network.

Using BOOTP 51

Bootptab file entries

The following is an example of a /etc/bootptab file entry for an HP JetDirect print server:

Note that the configuration data contains tags that identify the various HP JetDirect parameters and their settings. The following table describes these tags.

Tag	Description
nodename	The name of the peripheral. This is an entry point to a list of parameters for a specific peripheral. This must be the first tag in an entry. (In the example, the nodename is picasso.)
hn	The host name tag. This tag does not take a value, but it causes the BOOTP daemon to download the host name to the HP JetDirect print server. The host name is printed on the HP JetDirect configuration page or a network application returns the host name on an SNMP sysName request.
ht	The hardware type tag. For the HP JetDirect print server, set this tag to ether (for Ethernet) or token (for Token Ring). This tag must precede the ha tag.
vm	The BOOTP report format tag (required). Set this tag to rfc1048.
ha	The hardware address tag. The hardware (MAC) address is the HP JetDirect print server's link-level or station address. You can find this address on the HP JetDirect configuration page as the Hardware Address . On HP JetDirect external print servers, this address is also printed on a label attached to the print server.

Tag	Description
ip	The IP address tag (required). This is the HP JetDirect print server's IP address.
gw	The gateway IP address tag. This is the IP address of the default gateway (router) that the HP JetDirect print server uses to communicate with other subnets.
sm	The subnet mask tag. The HP JetDirect print server uses the subnet mask to identify the portions of an IP address that specify the network and subnetwork number and the host address.
lg	The syslog server's IP address tag. This is the address of the server where the HP JetDirect print server sends syslog messages.
T144	A vendor-specific tag that specifies the relative path name of the TFTP configuration file. You can truncate long path names. The path name must be enclosed with quotes (for example, "pathname"). See <u>Using DHCP</u> for more information about file formats.
	Note Standard BOOTP option 18 (extensions file path) also allows a standard tag (ef) to specify the relative path name of the TFTP configuration file.
T150	The TFTP server's IP address tag.
Т151	A BOOTP-only tag. You must specify BOOTP-ONLY to ensure that other dynamic configuration methods, such as DHCP, are not used.

Use the following conventions for the bootptab file entries:

- A colon (:) indicates the end of a field.
- A backslash (\) indicates that the entry is continued on the next line.
- Spaces are not allowed between the characters on a line.
- Names, such as host names, must begin with a letter and can contain only letters, numbers, periods (for domain names only), or hyphens.
- The underscore character (_) is not allowed.

See your system documentation or online help for more information.

Using DHCP

Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP), which is defined by Request for Comments (RFC) 2131 and 2132, is one of several auto configuration mechanisms that the HP JetDirect print server uses. If you have a DHCP server on your network, the HP JetDirect print server automatically obtains its IP address from that server and registers its name with any RFC 1001 and 1002-compliant dynamic name services as long as you have specified a Windows Internet Naming Service (WINS) server IP address.

Note

If the HP JetDirect print server does not receive its IP configuration within two minutes, a default IP address is automatically assigned: 192.0.0.192. You are advised not to leave this address as it is, but to change it to an address that fits into your network addressing scheme. You can, however, use this address to initially access the print server, and then change it to a more suitable one. To use the default IP address temporarily, set up your computer with an IP address in the same subnet, or establish an IP route to it.DHCP services must be available on the server. See your system documentation or online help to install or enable DHCP services.

Note

If the HP JetDirect print server and BOOTP/DHCP server are located on different subnets, the IP configuration might fail unless the routing device supports BOOTP Relay, which allows the transfer of BOOTP requests between subnets.

UNIX systems

See the bootpd man page for more information about setting up DHCP on UNIX systems.

On HP-UX systems, you might find a sample DHCP configuration file (dhcptab) in the /etc directory.

Since HP-UX presently does not provide Dynamic Domain Name Services (DDNS) for its DHCP implementations, Hewlett-Packard recommends that you set all print server lease durations to *infinite*. This ensures that print server IP addresses remain static until dynamic name services are provided.

Windows systems

HP JetDirect print servers support IP configuration from a Windows NT or 2000 DHCP server. This section describes how to set up a pool, or "scope," of IP addresses that the Windows server can assign or lease to any requester. When configured for BOOTP/DHCP operation (factory default), the HP JetDirect print server makes a request to the DHCP server for its IP configuration when you turn the print server on.

Note

This information is provided as an overview. See the information supplied with your DHCP software for specific information or for additional support.

Note

To avoid problems resulting from IP addresses that change, Hewlett-Packard recommends that you assign IP addresses with infinite leases or reserved IP addresses to all of you printers.

Windows NT 4.0 server

To set up a DHCP scope on a Windows NT 4.0 server, perform the following steps:

- 1 At the Windows NT server, open the **Program Manager** window, and double-click the **Network Administrator** icon.
- 2 Double-click the **DHCP Manager** icon.
- 3 Select Server, and select Server Add.
- 4 Type the server IP address, and click **OK** to return to the **DHCP Manager** window.
- 5 In the list of DHCP servers, select the server that you just added, select **Scope**, and select **Create**.
- 6 Select Set up the IP Address Pool. In the IP Address Pool section, set up the IP address range by typing the beginning IP address in the Start Address box and the ending IP address in the End Address box. Also type the subnet mask for the subnet to which the IP address pool applies. The starting and ending IP addresses define the end points of the address pool assigned to this scope.

Note

You can also exclude ranges of IP addresses within a scope.

7 In the Lease Duration section, select Unlimited, and select OK. To avoid the problems that result when IP addresses change, Hewlett-Packard recommends that you assign infinite leases to all of your printers. Be aware, however, that selecting an unlimited lease duration for the scope causes all of the clients in that scope to have infinite leases.

Note

If you want clients on your network to have finite leases, you can set the duration to a finite time, but you should configure all of your printers as reserved clients for the scope.

- 8 If you have assigned unlimited leases, skip to step 9. Otherwise, select Scope, and select Add Reservations to set up your printers as reserved clients. For each printer, perform the following steps in the Add Reserved Clients window:
 - **a** Type the selected IP address.
 - b Obtain the hardware (MAC) address from the configuration page, and type the address in the Unique Identifier box.
 - **c** Type the client name (any name is acceptable).
 - d To add the reserved client, select Add. To delete a reservation, in the DHCP Manager window, select Scope, and select Active Leases. In the Active Leases window, select the reservation that you want to delete, and select Delete.
- 9 To return to the **DHCP Manager** window, select **Close**.
- 10 If you are not planning to use Windows Internet Naming Service (WINS), skip to step 11. Otherwise perform the following steps to configuring your DHCP server:
 - a From the DHCP Manager window, select DHCP Options, and select one of the following:
 Scope If you only want Name Services for the selected scope.
 Global If you want Name Services for all scopes.
 - b Add the server to the Active Options list. From the DHCP Options window, select WINS/NBNS Servers (044) from the Unused Options list. Select Add, and select OK.
 - **c** A warning might appear requesting that you set the node type. You do this in step 10d.

- **d** To provide the WINS server's IP address, perform the following steps:
- e Select Value, and Edit Array.
- f From the IP Address Array Editor, select Remove to delete any undesired addresses previously set. Type the WINS server's IP address, and select Add.
- g Once the address appears in the list of IP addresses, select OK. This returns you to the DHCP Options window. If the address that you just added appears in the list of IP addresses (near the bottom of the window) return to step 10d. Otherwise, repeat step 10c.
- h In the DHCP Options window, select WINS/NBT Node Type (046) from the Unused Options list. Select Add to add the node type to the Active Options list. In the Byte box, type 0x4 to indicate a mixed node, and select OK.
- 11 To return to Program Manager, click Close.

Windows 2000 server

To set up a DHCP scope on a Windows 2000 server, perform the following steps:

- 1 To run the Windows 2000 DHCP manager utility, click Start, Settings, and Control Panel. Open the Administrative Tools folder, and run the DHCP utility.
- 2 In the DHCP window, find and select your Windows 2000 server in the DHCP tree. If your server is not listed in the tree, select **DHCP**, and click the **Action** menu to add the server.
- 3 After selecting your server in the DHCP tree, click the Action menu, and select New Scope. This runs the Add New Scope Wizard.
- 4 In the Add New Scope Wizard, click Next.
- 5 Enter a name and description for this scope, and click **Next**.
- 6 Type the range of IP addresses for this scope (beginning IP address and ending IP address). Also, type the subnet mask, and click Next.

Note

If you are using subnetting, the subnet mask defines which portion of an IP address specifies the subnet and which portion specifies the client device.

- 7 If applicable, type the range of IP addresses within the scope that you want the server to exclude, and click **Next**.
- 8 Type the IP address lease duration for your DHCP clients, and click **Next**. Hewlett-Packard recommends that you assign reserved IP addresses to all of your printers. You can do this after you set up the scope.
- 9 To configure the DHCP options for this scope later, select No, and click Next. To configure the DHCP options now, select Yes, and click Next.
 - **a** If desired, type the IP address of the router (or default gateway) that the clients will use, and click **Next**.
 - **b** If desired, type the domain name and Domain Name System (DNS) servers for the clients, and click **Next**.
 - c If desired, specify the WINS server names and IP addresses, and click Next.
 - d To activate the DHCP options now, select Yes, and click Next.
- You have successfully set up the DHCP scope on this server. To close the wizard, click Finish.
- 11 To configure your printer with a reserved IP address within the DHCP scope, perform the following steps:
 - **a** In the DHCP tree, open the folder for your scope, and select **Reservations**.
 - **b** Click the **Action** menu, and select **New Reservation**.
 - **c** Type the appropriate information in each field, including the reserved IP address for your printer.

Note

The MAC address for your HP JetDirect-connected printer is available on the HP JetDirect configuration page.

d Under Supported types, select DHCP only, and click Add.

Note

Selecting **Both** or **BOOTP only** results in a BOOTP configuration because of the sequence in which HP JetDirect print servers initiate the configuration protocol requests.

- e Specify another reserved client, or click Close. The reserved clients added are displayed in the Reservations folder for this scope.
- **12** Close the DHCP manager utility.

Enabling or disabling DHCP

If you do not want your HP JetDirect print server configured via DHCP, you must disable DHCP configuration. You can use one of the following methods to enable or disable DHCP:

- If you use the printer control panel to disable BOOTP on the HP JetDirect print server, DHCP is disabled.
- You can use Telnet to enable or disable DHCP operation on the HP JetDirect print server. When you use Telnet to disable a DHCP configuration Telnet, the print server automatically releases any names and IP addresses associated with the DHCP server and reinitializes the TCP/IP protocol for the print server. At this point, the print server is unconfigured and begins to send BOOTP and RARP requests to acquire new (non-DHCP) configuration information.
- You can use HP Web JetAdmin to modify the TCP/IP parameters.

If you manually provide an IP address when you use Telnet to disable DHCP, the print server still releases its DHCP-provided IP address but the print server does not send BOOTP and RARP configuration requests. Instead, the print server uses the configuration information that you provided. Therefore, if you provide the IP address, you should also manually set all of the configuration parameters, such as subnet mask, default gateway, and idle timeout.

Note

If you change the DHCP configuration state from disabled to enabled, the print server assumes that it should acquire its configuration information from a DHCP server. This means that when the Telnet session is completed, the TCP/IP protocol for the print server is reinitialized and all of the current configuration information is deleted. The print server then tries to acquire new configuration information by sending DHCP requests on the network to a DHCP server.

EN UNIX systems **59**

Moving to another network

When you move an HP JetDirect print server that is configured with an IP address to a new network, make sure that the IP address does not conflict with the IP addresses on the new network. You can change the print server's IP address to one that can be used on the new network, or you can erase the current IP address and configure another IP address after you install the print server on the new network. Cold reset the print server (see Troubleshooting the print server for instructions).

If the current BOOTP server cannot be reached, you might need to find a different BOOTP server and configure the printer to that server.

If you used BOOTP or DHCP to configure the print server, edit the appropriate system files with updated settings. If you manually set the IP address, reconfigure the IP parameters as described in this chapter.

Follow the instructions on the appropriate Home page to configure or modify your printer. These instructions show you how to configure your printer and set up the printer for printing.

Note

You can substitute the server.domain with the TCP/IP address.

Optimizing print quality for media types

Media type settings control the temperature of your printer's fuser. You can change the settings for the media that you are using to optimize the print quality. The following are the media types that you can optimize:

- Plain paper
- Bond paper
- Cardstock
- Envelope
- Heavy paper
- Labels
- Rough paper
- Thin paper
- Transparency

You can access the optimizing feature from the **Paper** tab in your printer driver or from HP LaserJet Device Configuration.

Printing speeds are automatically reduced when printing special-sized media.

Printing transparencies and labels


Only use transparencies and labels that are recommended for use in laser printers, such as HP transparency film and HP LaserJet labels. See <u>Printer media specifications</u> for more information.

CAUTION


Inspect the media to make sure that it is not wrinkled or curled and that it does not have any torn edges or missing labels.

To print transparencies or labels

- 1 Open the straight-through output door.
- 2 Load a single page in the priority input tray or load multiple pages in the main input tray. Make sure that the top of the media is forward and the side to be printed (rough side) is facing up.
- 3 Adjust the media guides.
- 4 Access the optimizing feature from the Paper tab in your printer driver or from HP LasetJet Device Configuration. Then select Optimize for: and choose transparency or labels in the drop-down box.
- 5 Print the document. Remove the media from the back of the printer as it prints to prevent it from sticking together and place the printed pages on a flat surface.




Printing envelopes









Printing one envelope

Only use envelopes that are recommended for laser printers. See <u>Printer media specifications</u> for more information.

Note

Use the priority input tray for printing one envelope. Use the main input tray for printing multiple envelopes.

- 1 To prevent the envelopes from curling as they print, open the straight-through output door.
- 2 Before loading the envelopes, slide the media guides outward to slightly wider than the envelopes.
- 3 Place the envelope with the stamp end forward and the side to be printed facing up.

Note

If the envelope has a flap on the short edge, feed that edge into the printer first.

4 Adjust the media guides to the length and width of the envelope. Set Optimize for: to Envelope, and print the envelope.

Printing multiple envelopes

Only use envelopes that are recommended for laser printers. See <u>Printer media specifications</u> for more information.


Use the priority input tray for printing one envelope. Use the main input tray for printing multiple envelopes.


- To prevent the envelopes from curling as they print, open the straight-through output door.
- 2 Before loading the envelopes, slide the media guides outward to slightly wider than the envelopes.
- 3 Place the envelopes with the stamp end forward and the side to be printed facing up.




If the envelopes have a flap on the short edge, feed that edge into the printer first.


- 4 Adjust the media guides to the length and width of the envelopes. Set Optimize for: to Envelope, and print the envelope.
- 5 Replace the priority input tray.












Printing letterhead or preprinted forms

To print letterhead or preprinted forms

- 1 Load the paper with the top forward and the side to be printed facing up. Adjust the media guides to fit the width of the paper.
- **2** Print the document.

Note

To print a single-page cover letter on letterhead, followed by a multiple-page document, load the letterhead in the priority input tray and load the standard paper in the main input tray. The printer automatically prints from the priority input tray first.



Cover letter followed by document. Use both input trays.

Printing custom-sized media or cardstock


The HP LaserJet 1200 Series can print on custom-sized media or cardstock between 76 by 127 mm (3 by 5 in.) and 216 by 356 mm (8.5 by 14 in.). Depending on the media, you can print up to 10 sheets from the priority input tray. Use the main input tray for multiple sheets.

CAUTION

Make sure that the sheets are not stuck together before you load them.

To print on custom-sized media or cardstock

- **1** Open the straight-through output door.
- **2** Load the media with the narrow side forward and the side to be printed facing up. Adjust the side and rear media guides to fit the media.
- 3 Select the correct size in the printer settings. (Software settings can override printer properties.)
- 4 Access the optimizing feature from the Paper tab in your printer driver or from HP LasetJet Device Configuration. Then select Optimize for: and choose cardstock in the drop-down box.
- **5** Print the document.



Printing with manual feed

You can use manual feed when printing mixed media, for example, an envelope, then a letter, then an envelope, and so on. Load an envelope in the priority input tray and load letterhead in the main input tray. You can also use manual feed to protect your privacy when printing to a network printer.

To print using manual feed, access the printer properties or printer setup in your software application, and select **Manual Feed** from the **Source Tray** drop-down list. See <u>Printer properties</u> (driver) for instructions. After you have enabled the setting, press the **Go** button (blinking) each time to print.



Printing on both sides of the paper (manual duplexing)

To print on both sides of the paper (manual duplexing), you must run the paper through the printer twice. You can print using the media output bin or the straight-through output path.

Hewlett-Packard recommends that you use the media output bin for lightweight paper and use the straight-through output path for any heavy media or media that curls when printed.

Note Manual duplexing is only supported in Windows.

Manual duplexing can cause the printer to become dirty, reducing print quality. See <u>Cleaning the printer</u> for instructions if the printer becomes dirty.




- 1 Make sure that the straight-through output door is closed.
- 2 Access the printer properties. See <u>Printer properties (driver)</u> for instructions. On the **Finishing** tab, click **Print on Both Sides**, select the **Flip Pages Up** check box, and click **OK**. Print the document.
- 3 After side one has printed, remove the remaining paper from the input tray, and set it aside until after you finish your manual duplexing job.
- **4** Gather the printed pages, turn the printed side down, and straighten the stack.
- 5 Place the stack back in the input tray. Side one should be facing down with the top edge toward the printer. Replace the priority input tray.

Click **OK** (on screen), and wait for side two to print.












Manual duplex on heavy media or card stock

For heavy media, such as card stock, use the straight-through output path.

- Load the media, and open the straight-through output door.
- 2 Access the printer properties. See Printer properties (driver) for instructions. On the Finishing tab, click Print on Both Sides, select the Straight Paper Path check box, and click OK. Print the document.
- 3 After side one has printed, remove the remaining paper from the input tray and set it aside until after you finish your manual duplexing job.
- 4 Gather the printed pages, turn the printed side down, and straighten the stack before placing it back in the input tray. Side one should be facing down with the top edge toward the printer.

Click **OK** (on screen), and wait for side two to print.



Printing watermarks

You can use the watermark option to print text "underneath" (in the background) of an existing document. For example, you might want to have large gray letters reading *Draft* or *Confidential* printed diagonally across the first page or all of the pages of a document.




Accessing the watermark feature

- 1 From your software application, access the printer properties. See Printer properties (driver) for instructions.
- 2 On the **Effects** tab (Windows) or the **Watermark/Overlay** screen (Macintosh), specify the type of watermark that you want to print on your document.

Printing multiple pages on a single sheet of paper (N-up printing)

You can select the number of pages that you want to print on a single sheet of paper. If you choose to print more than one page per sheet, the pages appear smaller and are arranged on the sheet in the order that they would otherwise be printed. You can specify up to 9 pages per sheet of paper.











You can print booklets on letter, legal, executive, or A4 paper.

- Load the paper, and make sure that the straight-through output door is closed.
- 2 Access the printer properties. See <u>Printer properties (driver)</u> for instructions. On the <u>Finishing</u> tab (Windows) or the <u>Layout</u> screen (Macintosh), select <u>Print on Both</u> <u>Sides</u>, and select <u>Letter (Left Binding)</u> in the Booklet pull-down menu. Print the booklet.
- 3 After side one has been printed, remove the remaining paper from the input tray, and set it aside until your booklet job is complete.
- **4** Gather the printed pages, turn the printed side down, and straighten the stack of paper.

- 5 Place the pages from side one back in the input tray. Side one should be facing down with the top edge toward the printer.
 - Click **OK** (on screen), and wait for side two to print.
- **6** Fold and staple the pages.

Canceling a print job

You can cancel a print job from a software application or a print queue.

To stop the printer immediately, remove the remaining paper from the printer. After the printer stops, use one of the following options.

- **Printer control panel:** To cancel the print job, press and release the **Go** button on the printer control panel.
- Software application: Typically, a dialog box appears briefly on your screen, allowing you to cancel the print job.
- Windows print queue: If a print job is waiting in a print queue (computer memory) or print spooler, delete the job there. Go to the Printer screen in Windows 9x, 2000, Millennium, and NT 4.0, click Start, Settings, and Printers. Double-click the HP LaserJet 1200 icon to open the window, select your print job, and click Delete.
- Desktop print queue (Mac OS): Open the printer queue by double-clicking on the printer's icon in the Finder. Then highlight the print job and click Trash.

If the status lights on the control panel continue to blink after you cancel a print job, the computer is still sending the job to the printer. Either delete the job from the print queue or wait until the computer finishes sending data. The printer will return to the Ready state.

Understanding print quality settings

Print quality settings affect how light or dark the print is on the page and the style that the graphics are printed. You can also use the print quality settings to optimize the print quality for a specific media type. See Optimizing print quality for media types for more information.

You can change the settings in the printer properties to accommodate the types of jobs you are printing. The following are the settings:

- Best Quality: This prints at 1200 dpi and provides the best print quality.
- **Faster Printing:** The resolution is reduced slightly so that the job can print faster. This is the default setting.
- **Custom:** This prints the same as the Faster Printing setting, but you can change the scale patterns.
- EconoMode (Save Toner): Text is printed using less toner.
 This setting is useful when you are printing drafts.

You can access these settings on the **Finishing** tab (Windows) under **Print Quality** settings in the printer properties. To view the details of each setting, click **Details**. For Macintosh, select the **Imaging Options** screen.

Note

To change the print quality settings for all future print jobs, access the properties through the **Start** menu in the Windows system tray. To change the print quality settings only for the current software application's use, access the properties through the **Print Setup** menu in the application you are using to print. See <u>Printer properties</u> (driver) for more information.

Using EconoMode (Save Toner)

An excellent way to extend the life of your toner cartridge is by using EconoMode. EconoMode uses substantially less toner than normal printing. The printed image is much lighter, but it is adequate for printing drafts or proofs.

To enable EconoMode, access the printer properties. On the **Finishing** tab (Windows) or the **Imaging Options** screen (Macintosh) under **Print Quality**, select **EconoMode**.

Note

See <u>Printer properties (driver)</u> for instructions on enabling EconoMode for all future jobs.



Editing scanned text (Optical Character Recognition)


You can use the Edit feature to edit faxes, letters, newspaper clippings, and many other documents. When you edit scanned text, an Optical Character Recognition (OCR) application reads the text, and you can import the text into a word processing program for editing. To change the link for your word processing program, use HP LaserJet Director.

The e-mail feature is not available in Windows 95.

Using the OCR feature (Windows 98, 2000, Millennium, NT 4.0, and Mac OS)

- 1 Load the original with the narrow side forward and the side to be scanned facing up.
- 2 Adjust the media guides.
- 3 Press the Scan button on the scanner. HP LaserJet Director launches unless you change the default settings or are networked.



4 In HP LaserJet Director, click OCR.

- 5 The original is scanned, and your word processing software application launches automatically. The scanned image has been optically read and is now ready to edit.
- 6 Edit your document.

If the word processing icon is not present or active, either you do not have a word processing software application installed on your computer or the scanner software did not recognize the application during the installation. Storing scanned text or images


HP software provides direct access to your file management system, which means that you can quickly store scanned images in any directory you choose. Using the Quick Copy feature

You can use the Quick Copy feature to quickly make a single copy of a document (up to 30 pages), even if your computer is turned off. You can change the default Quick Copy settings, if necessary, to provide the best looking copies for the type of original that you copy the most. These settings are applied to every Quick Copy job until you change them.

See <u>Quick Copy settings</u> for more information about changing the default Quick Copy settings, or see <u>Printer online help</u>.

- 1 Make sure that the printer is loaded with paper.
- 2 Load the original document (up to 30 pages) in the scanner paper input tray with the narrow side forward and the side to be copied facing up. Adjust the media guides to fit the original. See <u>Loading originals in the copier/scanner</u> for more information.
- 3 Open or close the straight-through output door to accommodate the copy job. If you are copying to standard-weight media, use the output bin (door closed). If you are copying to heavy media, use the straight-through output path (door open).
- 4 Press the **Copy** button on the scanner.

Quick Copy settings

You can change the default Quick Copy settings when your computer is turned on. Quick Copy settings remain the same for all future Quick Copy jobs, even when your computer is turned off, until you change the defaults again. Quick Copy settings include the following defaults:

- Number of copies = 1
- Collation = On
- Reduce or enlarge = Original (100%)
- Copy quality = Text
- Contrast = Middle Setting

Accessing the Quick Copy settings

- WIndows 9x, 2000, Millennium, and NT 4.0: In HP LaserJet Director, click Toolbox, and HP LaserJet Device Configuration. After the HP LaserJet Device Configuration opens, click on the Copy tab.
- If HP LaserJet Director is not running:

Using HP toner cartridges

HP policy on non-HP toner cartridges

Hewlett-Packard Company cannot recommend the use of non-HP toner cartridges, either new, refilled, or remanufactured. Since they are not HP products, HP cannot influence their design or control their quality.

Note

The warranty does not apply to defects resulting from software, interfacing, or parts not supplied by HP.

Storing toner cartridges

Do not remove the toner cartridge from its package until you are ready to use it. The shelf life of a toner cartridge in an unopened package is approximately 2.5 years. The shelf life of a toner cartridge in an opened package is approximately 6 months.

CAUTION

To prevent damage to the toner cartridge, do not expose it to light.

Toner cartridge life expectancy

The life of the toner cartridge depends on the amount of toner that your print jobs require. When printing text at 5% coverage, the standard toner cartridge (C7115A) lasts an average of 2,500 pages. The extended life toner cartridge (C7115X) lasts an average of 3,500 pages. This assumes that you set the print density to 3 and turn EconoMode off. (These are the default settings.)

Recycling toner cartridges

To reduce landfill waste, Hewlett-Packard has adopted a recycling program for empty toner cartridges. A postage-paid shipping label is inside the new HP LaserJet toner cartridge box. Since 1990, the HP LaserJet Toner Cartridge Recycling Program has collected more than 25 million used HP LaserJet toner cartridges that otherwise might have been discarded in the world's landfills. To join this recycling effort, follow the instructions provided in the new toner cartridge box.

To install a new HP toner cartridge, see <u>Changing the toner</u> <u>cartridge</u> or follow the instructions included in the toner cartridge box. See the recycling information on the toner cartridge box and the <u>HP Printing Supplies Environmental Program Information</u> included in the toner cartridge box.

Saving toner

To save toner, select the EconoMode option in your printer properties settings. While in EconoMode (Save Toner), the printer uses less toner on each page. Selecting this option will extend the life of the toner cartridge and reduce your cost per page, but it will reduce print quality. See Using EconoMode (Save Toner) for more information.

Redistributing toner

When toner is low, faded or light areas appear on the printed page. You might be able to temporarily improve print quality by redistributing the toner, which means that you might be able to finish the current print job before replacing the toner cartridge.









Changing the toner cartridge





- 4 Pull the tab until all the tape is removed from the cartridge. Put the tab in the toner cartridge box to return for recycling.
- 5 Insert the toner cartridge in the printer, making sure that the toner cartridge is in position. Close the toner door.



Illegal operation/General protection fault/Spool 32 error

A problem with your computer system resources (memory or hard disk) occurred in Windows. To clear this error, restart your computer.

To help prevent this error from occurring in the future, use some or all of the following recommendations:

- Run fewer applications at the same time. Close applications that you are not using instead of minimizing them. Programs such as screen savers, virus checkers, status software, fax/answering software, and menu programs use the resources that you might need to print.
- Avoid memory-intensive tasks such as sending a fax or running a video clip while printing.
- Delete all temp (file_name.tmp) files from the Temp subdirectories, such as C:\Windows\Temp.
- Print at a lower dpi.
- Use an alternate printer driver (printer software), such as software for the HP LaserJet III.

- 7 Find the desired PPD in the list and click Select. If the desired PPD is not listed, choose one of the following options:
 - Select a PPD for a printer with similar features.
 - Select a PPD from another folder.
 - Select the generic PPD by clicking Use Generic. The generic PPD allows you to print, but limits your access to printer features.
- 8 In the Setup dialog box, click **Select**, and then click **OK** to return to the Chooser.

9 Close the Chooser.

Renaming the Printer

If you are going to rename the printer, do this before selecting the printer in the Chooser. If you rename the printer after selecting it in the Chooser, you will have to go back into the Chooser and reselect it.

Use the Set Printer Name feature in the HP LaserJet Utility to rename the printer.

Troubleshooting PostScript (PS) Errors

The following situations are PS language specific and may occur when several printer languages are being used.

Note

To receive a printed or screen displayed message when PS errors occur, open the Print Options dialog box and click the desired selection next to the PS Errors section. You can also access this from the Print PS Errors check box in the HP LaserJet Device Configuration.

Garbled, incorrect, or incomplete text

The parallel or USB cable might be loose or defective. Try the following:

- Disconnect the cable and reconnect it at both ends.
- Try printing a job that you know works.
- If possible, attach the cable and printer to another computer, and try printing a job that you know works.
- Try using a new IEEE-1284 compliant parallel or USB cable. See <u>Accessories and ordering information</u>.

The wrong printer driver might have been selected when the software was installed. Make sure that the HP LaserJet 1200 is selected in the printer properties.

There might be a problem with your software application. Try printing from another software application.

Missing graphics or text, or blank pages

- Make sure that your file does not contain blank pages.
- The sealing tape might still be in the toner cartridge.
 Remove the toner cartridge, and pull out the sealing tape.
 Reinstall the toner cartridge. See <u>Changing the toner cartridge</u> for instructions. To check the printer, print a configuration page by pressing the **Go** button.
- The graphic settings in the printer properties might not be correct for the type of job that you are printing. Try a different graphic setting in the printer properties. See <u>Printer properties (driver)</u> for more information.
- The printer driver might not work for the type of job that you are printing. Try using a different printer driver (software), such as the printer driver for the HP LaserJet III.

Improving print quality

Light print or fade

- The toner supply is low. See <u>Managing the toner cartridge</u> for more information.
- The media might not meet Hewlett-Packard's media specifications (for example, the media is too moist or too rough). See <u>Printer media specifications</u> for more information.
- If the whole page is light, the print density adjustment is too light or EconoMode might be turned on. Adjust the print density and disable EconoMode in the printer properties.
 See <u>Saving toner</u> for more information.

Toner specks

- The media might not meet Hewlett-Packard's media specifications (for example, the media is too moist or too rough). See <u>Printer media specifications</u> for more information.
- The printer might need to be cleaned. See <u>Cleaning the</u> <u>printer</u> or <u>Cleaning the printer media path</u> for instructions.

Dropouts

- A single sheet of media might be defective. Try reprinting the job.
- The media's moisture content is uneven or the media has moist spots on its surface. Try printing with new media. See <u>Printer media specifications</u> for more information.
- The media lot is bad. The manufacturing processes can cause some areas to reject toner. Try a different type or brand of media.
- The toner cartridge might be defective. See <u>Managing the toner cartridge</u> for more information.

- Make sure that the priority input tray is in place.

- Check the printer's environment. Very dry (low humidity) conditions can increase the amount of background shading.

Toner smear

- If toner smears appear on the leading edge of the media, the media guides might be dirty. Wipe the media guides with a dry, lint-free cloth. See <u>Identifying the printer's components</u> or <u>Cleaning the printer</u> for more information.
- Check the media type and quality.
- Try installing a new HP toner cartridge. See <u>Changing the toner cartridge</u> for instructions.
- The fuser temperature might be too low. Check Optimize for: in the Paper tab of your printer driver, and make sure that it is set to the appropriate media.

Loose toner

Vertical repetitive defects

- The internal parts might have toner on them. See <u>Cleaning</u> the <u>printer</u> for more information. If the defects occur on the back of the page, the problem will probably correct itself after a few more printed pages.

Misformed characters

- If characters are improperly formed, producing hollow images, the media stock might be too slick. Try a different media. See <u>Printer media specifications</u> for more information.
- If characters are improperly formed, producing a wavy effect, the printer might need service. Print a configuration page. If the characters are improperly formed, contact an HP-authorized dealer or service representative. See <u>Service</u> and <u>support</u> for more information.

Page skew

- Open the straight-through output door and try printing straight through. See <u>Printer output paths</u> for more information.
- The fuser temperature might be too high. Check Optimize for: in the Paper tab of your printer driver, and make sure that it is set to the appropriate media.

Wrinkles or creases

- Make sure that media is loaded properly. See <u>Loading media</u> <u>into the input trays</u> for more information.
- Check the media type and quality. See Printer media specifications for more information.
- Open the straight-through output door and try printing straight through. See <u>Printer output paths</u> for more information.
- Turn over the stack of media in the tray. Also, try rotating the media 180° in the input tray.



Toner scatter outline

- If large amounts of toner have scattered around the characters, the media might be resisting the toner. (A small amount of toner scatter is normal for laser printing.) Try a different media type. See <u>Printer media specifications</u> for more information.
- Turn over the stack of media in the tray.
- Use media designed for laser printers. See <u>Printer media</u> <u>specifications</u> for more information.

Cleaning the printer

During the printing process, paper, toner, and dust particles can accumulate inside the printer. Over time, this buildup can cause print quality problems, such as toner specks or smearing. To correct and prevent these types of problems, you can clean the toner cartridge area and the printer media path. See the following sections for more information:

You do not need to clean the toner cartridge area often. However, cleaning this area can improve the quality of your printed sheets.


Before cleaning the printer, turn the printer off by unplugging the power cord, and wait for the printer to cool.


1 Open the toner door, and remove the toner cartridge.


CAUTION

To prevent damage, do not expose the toner cartridge to light. Cover the toner cartridge if necessary. Also, do not touch the black sponge transfer roller inside the printer. By doing so, you can damage the printer.

- With a dry, lint-free cloth, wipe any residue from the media path area and the toner cartridge cavity.
- 3 Replace the toner cartridge, and close the toner door.
- 4 Plug the power cord back into the printer.

Cleaning the printer media path

If you are experiencing toner specks or dots on the printouts, clean the printer media path. This process uses a transparency to remove dust and toner from the media path. Do not use bond or rough paper.

- 1 Load a transparency in the priority input tray.
- 2 Make sure that the printer is in the Ready state.
- 3 Press and hold the Go button for 10 seconds. The transparency feeds slowly through the printer. Discard the transparency.

Note	After holding the Go button for 10 seconds, each of the three printer lights blink until the cleaning process is complete.
Note	If transparency film is unavailable, you can use paper, but you should perform the procedure 2 or 3 times to ensure proper cleaning.

Clearing printer media jams

Occasionally, media becomes jammed during a print job. Some of the causes include the following:

- The input trays are loaded improperly or too full. See <u>Loading</u> media into the input trays for more information.
- The media does not meet HP specifications. See <u>Printer</u> media specifications for more information.

Note

When you add new media, always remove all of the media from the input tray and straighten the stack of new media. This helps prevent multiple sheets of media from feeding through the printer at one time, reducing media jams.

You are notified of a media jam by an error in the software and the printer control panel lights. See <u>Printer light patterns</u> for more information.

Typical media jam locations



- Toner cartridge area: See Removing a jammed page for instructions.
- Input tray areas: If the page is still sticking out of the input tray, gently try to remove it from the input tray without tearing the page. If you feel resistance, see <u>Removing a jammed</u> <u>page</u> for instructions.
- Output paths: If the page is sticking out of the output bin, gently try to remove it without tearing the page. If you feel resistance, see Removing a jammed page for instructions.

Note

There might be loose toner in the printer after a media jam. This toner clears up after a few sheets print.

Removing a jammed page

CAUTION

Media jams might result in loose toner on the page. If you get any toner on your clothes, wash them in cold water. *Hot* water will permanently set the toner into the fabric.


- 1 Open the toner door and the straight-through output door.
- 2 Rotate the green pressure release levers downward. If you can remove the media without removing the toner cartridge, do so, and continue with step 4.



- With both hands, grasp the side of the media that is most visible (this includes the middle), and carefully pull it free from the printer.
- When you have removed the jammed media, replace the toner cartridge, and close the toner door and the straight-through output door.

The pressure release levers automatically close when you close the straight-through output door.




Changing the pickup roller





- 2 Open the toner door, and remove the toner cartridge.

















- **5** Gently pull the pickup roller up and out.
- 6 Position the new or cleaned part in the slot of the previous pickup roller. See <u>Cleaning the pickup roller</u> for instructions.

Note

Circular and rectangular pegs on each side prevent you from incorrectly positioning the pickup roller.

- 7 Rotate the top of the new pickup roller away from you until both sides snap into place.
- 8 Reinstall the toner cartridge, and close the toner door.
- **9** Plug the printer in to turn it back on.

Cleaning the pickup roller

If you want to clean the pickup roller rather than replace it, follow the instructions below:

Remove the pickup roller as described in steps 1 through 5 of <u>Changing the pickup roller</u>.

1 Dab a lint-free cloth in isopropyl alcohol, and scrub the roller.


Alcohol is flammable. Keep the alcohol and cloth away from an open flame. Before you close the printer and plug in the power cord, allow the alcohol to dry completely.


- 2 Using a dry, lint-free cloth, wipe the pickup roller to remove loosened dirt.
- 3 Allow the pickup roller to dry completely before you reinstall it in the printer (see steps 6 through 9 of <u>Changing the pickup roller</u>).

Note

In certain areas of California, air pollution control regulations restrict the use of liquid Isopropyl Alcohol (IPA) as a cleaning agent. In those areas of California, please disregard the previous recommendations and use a dry, lint-free cloth. The cloth may be moistened with water if desired.







Changing the printer separation pad







- **3** Find the blue separation pad.
- 4 To pry the separation pad up from the spring-loaded base, insert a flat-edged screwdriver in the slot under the separation pad and twist until the tabs are free.


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


















- 5 Reach in through the opening, push the spring-loaded base down with one hand, and pull the separation pad up with the other hand.
- 6 With one hand, position the new separation pad in the slot of the previous separation pad (A). With the other hand, reach through the input tray opening, and push the spring-loaded base down (B).

Note

The tab on the right is larger to help you position it correctly.

7 Snap both sides of the separation pad firmly into place.

CAUTION

Make sure that the separation pad is straight and that there is no space between the separation pad and the spring-loaded base. If the separation pad is not straight or you see space on one side, remove the separation pad, make sure that the larger tab is on the right, reinsert the separation pad, and snap both sides into place.

8 Reinsert the pickup roller, toner cartridge, and input trays. Plug the printer in to turn it back on.

You can use this section to find the solution to common copier/scanner problems.

Scanning problems

- The scanner did nothing
- No preview appeared on the screen
- Scanned image is of poor quality
- Part of the image did not scan or text is missing
- The text cannot be edited
- The scan takes too long
- Error messages appear on the screen

Copying problems

- No copy came out of the printer or the scanner did nothing
- Copies are blank, missing images, or faded

The scanner did nothing

Solution

Description

Is the scanner correctly connected and latched to the printer?

The scanner must be connected and the cable must be attached. See the *Getting Started Guide* for attachment instructions. See <u>Removing the copier/scanner</u> for instructions on removing the scanner.

CAUTION

To prevent damage, unplug the printer before checking the copier/scanner connection.

Have you printed a configuration page to verify that the printer recognizes the scanner?

To verify that the scanner is installed, print a configuration page. To print a configuration page, press the **Go** button. In the middle right of the page, there will be a block titled "Copy Settings" if the copier/scanner is currently installed. If the block is not there, unplug the printer and plug it back in. If that does not work, make sure that the copier/scanner is properly connected to the printer. See the *Getting Started Guide* included with your copier/scanner for attachment instructions. See Removing the copier/scanner for instructions on removing the copier/scanner.

Did you send a print or copy job before you tried to scan?

If you sent a print or copy job before you tried to scan, wait until after the print or copy job is complete before scanning. The job might still be in the queue. Check the light status on the printer. See Printer light patterns for more information.

Is the parallel or USB cable working and connected correctly?

The parallel or USB cable might be defective. Try the following:

- Disconnect the parallel or USB cable on both ends and reconnect it.
- Try printing a job that you know prints.
- If possible, attach the cable and printer to another computer and print a job that you know prints.
- Try using a new IEEE-1284 compliant parallel cable or USB-1f compliant cable. See <u>Accessories and ordering</u> <u>information</u>.
- Contact the manufacturer of your computer about changing parallel port settings to ECP (extended capabilities port).

Solution

Description

Do you have other devices running on your computer?

The HP LaserJet 1220 Print•Copy•Scan might not share a USB or parallel port. If you have a sound card, external hard drive, or network switchbox connected to the same port as the HP LaserJet 1220, the other device might be interfering. To connect and use the HP LaserJet 1220, you must disconnect the other device or you must use two ports on the computer. You might need to add another interface card. Hewlett-Packard strongly recommends an ECP parallel interface card. See the documentation that came with your computer for information about installing an additional parallel interface card or resolving device conflicts.

No preview appeared on the screen

Solution	Description
Are you currently copying or printing?	Wait for the copy or print job to complete before trying to scan.
Is the original loaded correctly?	Make sure that the original is loaded correctly: narrow side first, top forward in the scanner media input tray with the side to be scanned facing up. See <u>Loading originals in the copier/scanner</u> for more information.
Is the scanner correctly connected and latched to the printer?	The scanner must be connected and the cable must be attached. See the <i>Getting Started Guide</i> included with your scanner for attachment instructions. See Removing the copier/scanner for instructions on removing the copier/scanner.
	CAUTION To prevent damage, unplug the printer before checking the copier/scanner connection.
Is the wrong printer selected?	Make sure that the HP LaserJet 1200 is selected as the current printer when you print.

Scanned image is of poor quality

Solution	Description
Is the original a second generation photo or picture?	Reprinted photographs, such as those in newspapers or magazines, are printed using tiny dots of ink that make an interpretation of the original photograph, which dramatically decreases the quality. Often, the ink dots form unwanted patterns that, when scanned and reprinted or displayed, can be detected. If the following suggestions do not solve your problem, you might need to use a better quality version of the original. To eliminate the patterns, try reducing the size of the scanned image. See Enhancing the scanned image in HP Document Manager for more information. Print the scanned image to see if the quality is better. Make sure that your resolution and color settings are correct for the type of scan job that you are performing. See Scanner resolution and color for more information.
Is the image quality better when printed?	 The image displayed on the screen is not always an accurate representation of the quality of the scan. Try adjusting the settings on your computer monitor to display more colors (or levels of gray). Typically, you make this adjustment by selecting Display found in the Control Panel. See the documentation that came with your computer. Try adjusting the resolution and color settings in the scanner software. See <u>Scanner resolution and color</u> for more information.
Is the image skewed (crooked)?	The original might have been loaded incorrectly. It is important to use the media guides when you load the originals. See Loading originals in the copier/scanner for more information.
Does the scanned image have unwanted blots, lines, vertical white stripes, or any other defect?	See Improving copy/scan quality for more information.
Is the scanner dirty?	If the scanner is dirty, the image produced will not have optimum clarity. See <u>Cleaning the copier/scanner</u> for instructions.

Solution Description The graphics settings might not be suitable for the type of scan job that you are performing. Try changing the graphics settings. Access these settings through the printer properties (driver). See Printer properties (driver) for more information.

Part of the image did not scan or text is missing

Solution	Description
Was the original loaded correctly?	Make sure that you loaded the original correctly. See <u>Loading</u> <u>originals in the copier/scanner</u> for instructions.
Does the original have a colored background?	Colored backgrounds can cause images in the foreground to blend too much. Try adjusting the settings before you scan the original or enhancing the image after you scan the original. See Adjusting the contrast for instructions. Also see Scanner resolution and color for more information.
Is the original longer than 762 mm (35 in.)?	The maximum scannable length is 762 mm (35 in.). If the page exceeds the maximum length, the scanner stops.
	CAUTION Do not try to pull the original from the scanner; you might damage the scanner or your original. See <u>Clearing</u> <u>copier/scanner jams</u> for instructions.
Is the original too small?	The minimum size supported in the copier/scanner for the HP LaserJet 1200 is 50.8 by 90 mm (2 by 3.5 in.). The original might be jammed. See <u>Clearing copier/scanner jams</u> for instructions.
Are you using HP LaserJet Director?	Your default property settings for HP LaserJet Director might be set to automatically perform a specific task other than the one you are attempting. For example, you can set HP LaserJet Director to automatically perform a scan to e-mail. This means that your image does not show up on the screen but is attached to an e-mail message as a file. See the online help for instructions on changing the properties in HP LaserJet Director. See Accessing the online help.
Is the paper size correct?	In Scan Settings, make sure that the input paper size is large enough for the document that you are scanning.
Did you check for missing text in selected regions?	Scan your document in page-by-page mode and make sure that missing text is in a selected region.

The text cannot be edited

Solution	Description
Have you specified either HP LaserJet Director or HP LaserJet Document Manager to Edit text (OCR)?	Text remains as a single image until the Optical Character Recognition (OCR) application converts the single image into text that you can edit. See Editing scanned text (Optical Character Recognition) for more information.
Is the correct word processing application linked with the OCR application?	Your OCR application might be linked to a word processing application that does not perform this task. See the HP online help for more information about linking applications.
Does the original have text that is tightly spaced?	The OCR application might not recognize text that is tightly spaced. For example, if the text that the OCR application converts has missing or combined characters, rn might appear as m .
Is the original of poor quality?	The accuracy of the OCR application depends on the quality, size, and structure of the original and the quality of the scan itself. Make sure that your original is of good quality.
Does the original have a colored background?	Colored backgrounds can cause images in the foreground to blend too much. Try adjusting the settings before you scan the original or enhancing the image after you scan the original. See Adjusting the contrast for instructions. Also see Scanner resolution and color for more information.

The scan takes too long

Solution	Description
Do you have your resolution and grayscale set too high?	If you set the resolution and grayscale too high, the scan job takes longer and results in larger files. To obtain good results when scanning or copying, it is important that you use the correct resolution and grayscale settings for your job. See Scanner resolution and color for more information.
Is your software set to scan in color?	Your system defaults to color, which takes longer to scan even if you are scanning a monochrome original. If you acquire an image through TWAIN, you can change the settings to scan in black and white. See Accessing the online help for more information.
Did you send a print or copy job before you tried to scan?	If you sent a print or copy job before you tried to scan, the scan will start if the scanner is not busy. However, the printer and scanner share memory, which means that the scan might be slower.
Is your computer set for bidirectional communication?	See the documentation that came with your computer to change the BIOS settings. The recommended bidirectional setting is ECP.

Error messages appear on the screen

Solution

Description

Unable to activate TWAIN source

- If you are acquiring an image from another device, such as a digital camera or another scanner, make sure that the other device is TWAIN compliant. Non-TWAIN-compliant devices do not work with the HP LaserJet 1220 Print•Copy•Scan software.
- Make sure that you have connected the USB or parallel cable to the correct port on the back of your computer. If you have another port, try attaching the cable to the other port. Make sure that you have an SPP-(bidirectional) or ECP-compliant parallel port on your computer. An SPP parallel port is the minimum; an ECP parallel port is strongly recommended. See the documentation that came with your computer for more information about your port.
- Some devices might not share the parallel port with the printer. If you have a sound card, external hard drive, or network switchbox connected to the same USB or parallel port as the HP LaserJet 1220, the other device might be interfering. To connect and use the HP LaserJet 1220, you must disconnect the other device or you must use two ports on the computer. You might need to add another parallel interface card. Hewlett-Packard strongly recommends an ECP parallel interface card. See the documentation that came with your computer for more information about installing an additional parallel interface card or resolving device conflicts.

No copy came out of the printer or the scanner did nothing

Solution	Description
Is media loaded in the input tray?	Load media in the printer. See <u>Loading media into the input trays</u> for more information.
Is the original loaded correctly?	Make sure that the original is loaded correctly: narrow side first, top down in the scanner input tray, and the side to be scanned or copied facing up. See Loading originals in the copier/scanner for more information.
Is the scanner correctly connected and the cable attached to the printer?	The scanner must be connected and the cable must be attached. See the <i>Getting Started Guide</i> for attachment instructions. See Removing the copier/scanner for instructions on removing the scanner.
	CAUTION To prevent damage, unplug the printer before checking the copier/scanner connection.
Is the wrong printer selected?	In Copy Plus, make sure that the HP LaserJet 1220 is selected in the Printer field as the current printer when you print.
Have you printed a configuration page to verify that the printer recognizes the scanner?	To verify that the scanner is installed, print a configuration page. To print a configuration page, press the Go button. In the right middle of the page, there will be a block titled "Copy Settings" if the copier/scanner is installed correctly. If this block is not there, unplug the printer and plug it back in. If that does not work, make sure that the copier/scanner is properly connected to the printer. See the <i>Getting Started Guide</i> included with your copier/scanner for attachment instructions. See Removing the copier/scanner for instructions on removing the copier/scanner.

Copies are blank, missing images, or faded

Description
The Quick Copy settings might not produce good results for the type of copy job you are attempting. See <u>Understanding copying features</u> for more information.
Each new toner cartridge is packaged with protective plastic tape. See <u>Changing the toner cartridge</u> to verify that the protective tape has been removed.
Copies are made using the printer. If the toner cartridge is low on toner, the copies will be faded. You might be able to extend the life of the toner cartridge slightly by redistributing the toner, but make sure that you have another cartridge available to install. See Redistributing toner for instructions.
The accuracy of the copy depends on the quality and size of the original. Try adjusting the contrast with HP LaserJet Copier. See <u>Using HP LaserJet Copier</u> for instructions. If your original is too light, the copy might not be able to compensate, even if you adjust the contrast.
Colored backgrounds might cause images in the foreground to blend too much or the background to appear in a different shade. Try using HP LaserJet Copier to adjust the settings before copying or to enhance the image after it has been copied. See <u>Using HP LaserJet Copier</u> for instructions. Also see <u>Scanner resolution and color</u> for more information.
The maximum scannable length is 762 mm (35 in.). If the page exceeds the maximum length, the copier/scanner stops.
CAUTION Do not try to pull the original from the scanner; you might damage the scanner or your original. See <u>Clearing</u> copier/scanner jams for instructions.
The minimum size supported in the HP LaserJet 1220 copier/scanner is 50.8 by 90 mm (2 by 3.5 in.). The original might be jammed. See <u>Clearing copier/scanner jams</u> for instructions.

Preventing problems

The following are a few simple steps that you can take to improve copy and scan quality:

- Use quality originals.
- Load the media correctly. If the media is loaded incorrectly, it might skew, causing unclear images and problems with the OCR application. See <u>Loading originals in the copier/scanner</u> for instructions.
- Open or close the straight-through output door on the copier/scanner to accommodate the copy job. If you are copying to standard weight media, use the output bin (door closed). If you are copying to heavy media, use the straight-through output path (door open).
- Adjust the software settings according to how you plan to use the copy or scanned page. See <u>Enhancing the scanned</u> <u>image in HP Document Manager</u> and <u>Scanner resolution and</u> <u>color</u> for more information.
- If your copier/scanner frequently feeds more than one page at a time, replace the copier/scanner separation pad. Recurring feed problems indicate that the copier/separation pad is worn. See <u>Accessories and ordering information</u> to order a new copier/scanner separation pad. See <u>Paper</u> <u>handling problems</u> for more information about replacing the copier/scanner separation pad.
- Use or make a carrier sheet to protect your originals.

Identifying and correcting copy/scan defects

Vertical white stripes

- The media might not meet Hewlett-Packard's media specifications (for example, the media is too moist or too rough). See <u>Printer media specifications</u> for more information.
- The toner might be low. See <u>Redistributing toner</u> for instructions.

Blank pages

- The original might have been loaded upside down. Load the original with the narrow side forward and the side to be scanned facing up. See <u>Loading originals in the</u> <u>copier/scanner</u> for instructions.
- The media might not meet Hewlett-Packard's media specifications (for example, the media is too moist or too rough). See <u>Printer media specifications</u> for more information.
- The toner might be out. See <u>Changing the toner cartridge</u> for instructions.
- The tape might not have been removed from the toner cartridge. See <u>Changing the toner cartridge</u> for instructions.

Too light or dark

- Try adjusting the settings.
 - HP LaserJet Copier: see <u>Using HP LaserJet Copier</u> for more information.
 - Quick Copy settings: see <u>Using the Quick Copy feature</u> for more information.
 - Make sure that you have the correct resolution and color settings. See <u>Scanner resolution and color</u> for more information.
- You might need to change the properties settings for the associated function in HP LaserJet Director or HP Document Manager. See Accessing the online help.













Unwanted lines

- Make sure that the priority input tray is in place.
- Ink, glue, correction fluid, or an unwanted substance might be on the scanner sensor. Try cleaning the copier/scanner.

- The photosensitive drum inside the toner cartridge has probably been scratched. Install a new HP toner cartridge.
 See <u>Changing the toner cartridge</u> for instructions.

Black dots or streaks

Ink, glue, correction fluid, or an unwanted substance might be on the scanner sensor. Try cleaning the copier/scanner. See <u>Cleaning the copier/scanner</u> for instructions.

Unclear text


Cleaning the copier/scanner











You might need to clean the copier/scanner after scanning or copying items that have ink that smudges or that have excessive dirt or dust.

- 1 Unplug the printer to turn the power off, and wait for the scanner to cool.
- 2 Open the scanner door.
- 3 Dampen a clean, cotton cloth with isopropyl alcohol (pH7 or neutral pH). With the damp cloth, gently rub back and forth on the white platen. Also, use the damp cloth to gently rub the rollers.

WARNING!

Alcohol is flammable. Keep the alcohol and cloth away from an open flame. Allow the alcohol to dry completely before you plug in the power cord.

Spray glass cleaner on another piece of clean, cotton cloth, and carefully clean the glass on the image sensor.

WARNING!

Make sure that the scanner is completely dry before you plug in the printer power cord.

5 Plug the printer in to turn it back on.

Note

In certain areas of California, air pollution control regulations restrict the use of liquid Isopropyl Alcohol (IPA) as a cleaning agent. In those areas of California, please disregard the previous recommendations and use a dry, lint-free cloth. The cloth may be moistened with water if desired.

Clearing copier/scanner jams

Occasionally, media becomes jammed during a scan or copy job. Some of the causes include the following:

- The input trays are loaded improperly. See <u>Loading originals</u> in the <u>copier/scanner</u> for instructions.
- The original is too small or too large to feed correctly through the copier/scanner. See <u>Supported media sizes and types</u> for more information.
- The original exceeds the maximum page length. See <u>Supported media sizes and types</u> for more information.
- The media does not meet Hewlett-Packard specifications.
 See <u>Printer media specifications</u> for more information.

An error message appears on your computer screen when a jam occurs.




Clearing jams

- 1 Open the straight-through output door, and press the door release button to open the scanner door.
- 2 Find and grasp the original from the straight-through output door or copier/scanner door, whichever side sticks out further.
- 3 Pull gently and steadily.










Replacing the copier/scanner separation pad









If your copier/scanner input tray feeds more than one page at a time, you might need to change the copier/scanner separation pad. Recurring problems indicate that the copier/scanner separation pad is worn. See Accessories and ordering information to order a new copier/scanner separation pad.

- 1 To open the copier/scanner door, press the release button.
- 2 Grasp the separation pad and mylar sheet firmly between your thumb and index finger, and pull them straight up and out.

Note

You will feel resistance because the tabs attach the black pad holder to the copier/scanner. This is normal. The pad holder is part of the replacement unit. It is also released by your action.

- 3 Snap the new pad holder, with the separation pad and mylar attached, into position.
- 4 Close the copier/scanner door.






If you remove the copier/scanner before you unplug the printer, you might damage your printer and scanner. You must also unplug the printer before you reinstall the copier/scanner on the printer.

- 1 Turn off the power switch (220 v models only) and unplug the printer.
- **2** Open and remove the left side panel.
- 3 Pull up on the scanner cable to disconnect it from the printer.
- 4 Slide the copier/scanner up and away from the printer.

















- 5 Replace the left side panel. See Closing the left side panel for instructions.
- **6** Replace the copier/scanner access panel.

Closing the left side panel

To close the left side panel, attach it at the front of the printer first. There are two hinges that hold the front of the panel in place. Then swing the panel in until it clicks into place.



Note

Make sure the left side panel is completely closed. If it is not, the toner door will not close completely, the amber light will blink, and the printer will not work.

10 or 100 link	Both off	There is no network connection.

Using a print server configuration page

The information on the print server configuration page reveals the status of your network and the HP JetDirect 175X print server. If you can print a configuration page, your hardware is working correctly.

Printing a print server configuration page

Press the **Test** button on the rear panel of the print server. If you are not sure if the configuration page is in the process of printing, check the power/status LED. If the page never appears on the printer (or if it is unreadable), press and hold the **Test** button to change the page description language (PDL). Then press the **Test** button once to request the page. Repeat if necessary.

Understanding the print server configuration page

The configuration page includes messages, network statistics, and status. These messages include configuration information and error messages for the HP JetDirect print server. You can also view the HP JetDirect configuration page over the network from a management utility (such as HP Web JetAdmin) or by accessing the embedded Web server on the HP JetDirect print server.

Status field error messages

The configuration page contains several Status fields for the print server and the supported protocols. One or more error codes and related error messages can be displayed in a Status field. See Error messages for information about each error message.

Page sections and messages

General HP JetDirect information	Provides general print server status and identification information.
USB port information	Provides the USB printer class descriptors for the device that is connected to the port.
Network statistics	Provides the current values for various network parameters that the print server monitors.

08 LAN ERROR – INFINITE DEFERRAL	There is a network congestion problem.
	Note If the print server is not connected to the network, this error cannot occur.
09 LAN ERROR – BABBLE	Check the network connections. If the connections are intact, run the power-on self-test: turn the printer off and back on. If the error persists, replace the print server.

28 OUT OF BUFFERS	The print server could not allocate a buffer from its internal memory. This means that all of the buffers are busy, which might be a result of heavy broadcast traffic or large amounts of network traffic directed to the print server.

45 INVALID SYSLOG ADDRESS	The syslog server IP address specified for the print server (through BOOTP) is an invalid IP address for specifying a single node. Check your Bootptab file for the proper entries.
46 INVALID SERVER ADDRESS	The TFTP server IP address specified for the print server (through BOOTP) is an invalid IP address for specifying a single node. Check your Bootptab file for the proper entries.
47 INVALID TRAP DEST ADDRESS	One of the SNMP trap (Trap PDU) destination IP addresses specified for the print server (through TFTP) is an invalid IP address for specifying a single node. Check your TFTP configuration file.
48 CF ERR – FILE INCOMPLETE	The TFTP configuration file contained an incomplete last line that did not end in a new line character.
49 CF ERR – LINE TOO LONG	A line being processed in the TFTP configuration file was longer than the print server could accept.
4A CF ERR – UNKNOWN KEYWORD	A TFTP configuration file line contained an unknown keyword.
4B CF ERR – MISSING PARAMETER	A line in the TFTP configuration file was missing a required parameter.
4C CF ERR – INVALID PARAMETER	One of the parameters on a line in the TFTP configuration file contained an invalid value.

Error Code and Message	Description
4D CF ERR – ACCESS LIST EXCEEDED	The TFTP configuration file specified too many access list entries using the "allow:" keyword.
4E CF ERR – TRAP LIST EXCEEDED	The TFTP configuration file specified too many trap destination list entries using the "trap-destination:" keyword.
4F TFTP REMOTE ERROR	The TFTP transfer of the configuration file from the host to the print server failed with the remote host sending a TFTP ERROR packet to the print server.
50 TFTP LOCAL ERROR	The TFTP transfer of the configuration file from the host to the print server failed with the local print server encountering some form of inactivity timeout or excessive retransmissions situation.
51 TFTP RETRIES EXCEEDED	The overall retrying of the TFTP transfer of the configuration file from the host to the print server has exceeded a retry limit.
52 BAD BOOTP/DHCP REPLY	An error was detected in the BOOTP or DHCP reply that the print server received. 

- Remove and keep any cables, trays, and optional accessories installed in the printer.
- Remove and keep the toner cartridge.

HP LaserJet printers produce excellent print quality. The printer accepts a variety of media, such as cut-sheet paper (including recycled paper), envelopes, labels, transparencies, vellum, and custom-sized paper. Properties such as weight, grain, and moisture content are important factors affecting printer performance and output quality.

The printer can use a variety of paper and other print media in accordance with the guidelines in this user guide. Media that does not meet these guidelines might cause the following problems:

- Poor print quality
- Increased media jams
- Premature wear on the printer, requiring repair

For best results, use only HP brand paper and print media. Hewlett-Packard Company cannot recommend the use of other brands. Because they are not HP products, HP cannot influence or control their quality.

It is possible for media to meet all of the guidelines in this user guide and still not produce satisfactory results. This might be the result of improper handling, unacceptable temperature and humidity levels, or other variables over which Hewlett-Packard has no control.

Before you purchase a large quantity of media, make sure that it meets the requirements specified in this user guide and in *Guidelines for Paper and Other Print Media*. (See <u>Accessories and ordering information</u> for more information about ordering the guidelines.) Always test media before you purchase a large quantity.

Guidelines for using media

Paper

For best results, use conventional 20 lb (75 g/m^2) paper. Make sure that the paper is of good quality and free of cuts, nicks, tears, spots, loose particles, dust, wrinkles, voids, and curled or bent edges.

If you are unsure about what type of paper you are loading (such as bond or recycled), check the label on the package of paper.

Some paper causes print quality problems, jamming, or damage to the printer.

Labels

Label construction

When selecting labels, consider the quality of the following components:

- **Adhesives:** The adhesive material should be stable at 200° C (392° F), the printer's maximum temperature.
- Arrangement: Only use labels with no exposed backing between them. Labels can peel off sheets that have spaces between the labels, causing serious jams.
- **Curl:** Prior to printing, labels must lie flat with no more than 13 mm (0.5 in.) of curl in any direction.
- **Condition:** Do not use labels with wrinkles, bubbles, or other indications of separation.

Transparencies

Transparencies must be able to withstand 200° C (392° F), the printer's maximum temperature.

Envelopes


Envelope construction

Envelope construction is critical. Envelope fold lines can vary considerably, not only between manufacturers, but also within a box from the same manufacturer. Successful printing on envelopes depends upon the quality of the envelopes. When selecting envelopes, consider the following components:

- **Weight:** The weight of the envelope paper should not exceed 28 lb (105 g/m²), or jamming might result.
- Construction: Prior to printing, envelopes should lie flat with less than 6 mm (0.25 in.) curl and should not contain air.
 Envelopes that trap air may cause problems.
- Condition: Make sure that the envelopes are not wrinkled, nicked, or otherwise damaged.
- **Sizes:** From 90 x 160 mm (3.5 x 6.3 in.) to 178 x 254 mm (7 x 10 in.).

Envelopes with double-side seams

An envelope with double-side-seam construction has vertical seams at both ends of the envelope rather than diagonal seams. This style might be more likely to wrinkle. Make sure that the seam extends all the way to the corner of the envelope as shown in the following illustration:



Envelopes with adhesive strips or flaps

Envelopes with a peel-off adhesive strip or with more than one flap that folds over to seal must use adhesives compatible with the heat and pressure in the printer: 200° C (392° F). The extra flaps and strips might cause wrinkling, creasing, or jams.

Envelope storage

Proper storage of envelopes contributes to good print quality. You should store envelopes flat. If air is trapped in an envelope, creating an air bubble, the envelope might wrinkle during printing.

Card stock and heavy media

You can print many types of card stock from the paper input tray, including index cards and postcards. Some card stock performs better than others because its construction is better suited for feeding through a laser printer.

For optimum printer performance, do not use paper heavier than 42 lb (157 g/m²). Paper that is too heavy might cause misfeeds, stacking problems, paper jams, poor toner fusing, poor print quality, or excessive mechanical wear.

Note

You might be able to print on heavier paper if you do not fill the input tray to capacity and if you use paper with a smoothness rating of 100-180 Sheffield.

Card stock construction

- **Smoothness**: 36-42 lb (135-157 g/m²) card stock should have a smoothness rating of 100-180 Sheffield. 16-36 lb (60-135 g/m²) card stock should have a smoothness rating of 100-250 Sheffield.
- Construction: Card stock should lie flat with less than 5 mm (0.2 in.) of curl.
- **Condition:** Make sure that the card stock is not wrinkled, nicked, or otherwise damaged.
- Sizes: Only use card stock within the following size ranges:
 - **Minimum:** 76 x 127 mm (3 x 5 in.)
 - Maximum: 216 x 356 mm (8.5 x 14.0 in.)

Card stock guidelines

- If the card stock curls or jams, print using the straight-through output path.
- Set margins at least 2 mm (0.08 in.) away from the edges.

- 4 Position the DIMM chip in front of the slot located inside the I/O door. The gold contacts should be pointing toward the printer and the cutouts should be at the top and bottom.
- 5 Carefully press the DIMM chip into the slot, making sure that it is straight and all the way in (A). The cam latches, located at the top and bottom, should rotate inward. To snap the cam latches into place, press the handles toward each other (B).

Testing the DIMM installation



Overview

If you are printing a scanned image or copying an image and the quality is not as you expected, you might have selected a resolution or color setting in the copier/scanner software that does not match your needs. Resolution and color affect scanned and copied images in the following ways:

- Image clarity
- Texture of gradations (smooth or rough)
- Scan and copy time
- File size

Resolution is measured in dots per inch (dpi) while color and grayscale are measured by the number of colors possible. You can adjust the scanner resolution up to 600 dpi. You can set color and grayscale at 1 (black and white) or 8 (256 levels of gray) to 24 bit (true color).

The <u>Resolution and color guidelines</u> table lists simple tips that you can follow to meet your scanning and copying needs. Also see <u>Resolution</u> and <u>Color</u> to learn more about these topics.

Note

Setting the resolution and color to a high value can create large files that take up disk space and slow the scanning or copying process. It is important that you determine how you are going to use the scanned image.



Resolution

Generally, the ideal scanning resolution is 150 dots per inch (dpi). Changing the size of the image after you have scanned it affects the resolution. Therefore, before you set the scanner resolution, determine what the final image size will be. For example, you might want to scan an original that is $76 \times 127 \text{ mm}$ (3 x 5 in.), but there is only room for a $38 \times 63.5 \text{ mm}$ (1.5 x 2.5 in.) image in your document. Set the scanner resolution to 75 dpi.
