## Display

## Display Layout

The display has three areas:

## Backlight

A backlight illuminates the display and the keypad. When you press any key or open the folder, the backlight turns on. It turns off when no keys are pressed within a given period of time, depending on your setting in the Back Light menu (Menu 9.1.5). After one minute, the display turns off to conserve your battery power.
To specify the length of time the backlight is active, set the Back Light menu (Menu 9.1.5). See "Back Light" on page 150 for further details.

## Service Light

The service light is at the top right-hand corner of the phone. It flashes when services are available on the phone.
To activate or deactivate the use of the service light, set the Service Light menu (Menu 9.1.6). See "Service Light" on page 150 for further details.


## Getting Started

## Installing the SIM Card

When you subscribe to a cellular network, you are provided with a plug-in SIM card loaded with your subscription details, such as your PIN, any optional services available and many others.
Important! The plug-in SIM card and its contacts can be easily damaged by scratches or bending, so be careful when handling, inserting or removing the card.
Keep all SIM cards out of the reach of small children.

1. If necessary, turn off the phone by holding down the $\boldsymbol{\Omega}$ / $\mathbb{C}$ key until the power-off image displays.
2. Remove the battery. To do so:

- Press and hold the battery lock above the battery upward toward the top of the phone.

3. Lift the battery away, as shown.

4. Slide the SIM card into the SIM card socket so that it locks the card into place. Make sure the gold contacts of the card face into the phone.


Note: When you need to remove the SIM card, slide it, as shown, and take it out of the socket.

5. Place the battery so that the tabs on the end align with the slots at the bottom of the phone.

6. Press the battery until it clicks into place. Make sure that the battery is properly installed before switching the phone on.


## Charging a Battery

Your phone is powered by a rechargeable Li-ion battery. A travel adapter comes with your phone for charging the battery. Use only approved batteries and chargers. Ask your local Samsung dealer for further details.

You can use the phone while the battery is charging, but this causes the phone to charge more slowly.

Note: You must fully charge the battery before using your phone for the first time. A discharged battery is fully recharged in approximately 200 minutes.

1. With the battery in position on the phone, plug the connector of the travel adapter into the jack at the bottom of the phone.

2. Plug the adapter into a standard AC wall outlet.
3. When charging is finished, unplug the adapter from the power outlet and disconnect it from the phone by pressing the gray
tabs on both sides of the connector and pulling the connector out.


Note: You must unplug the adapter before you remove the battery from the phone during charging; otherwise, the phone could be damaged.

## Low Battery Indicator

When the battery is weak and only a few minutes of talk time remain, you hear a warning tone and a message repeats at regular intervals on the display. When this happens, your phone turns off the backlight to conserve the remaining battery power.
When the battery level gets too low, the phone automatically turns off.

## Switching the Phone On/Off

1. Open the folder.
2. Press and hold the $\boldsymbol{\Omega}$ /C key until the phone switches on.
3. If the phone asks you to enter the phone password, enter the password and press the OK soft key. The phone password is
factory set to "00000000." For further details, see "Change Password" on page 153.
4. If the phone asks for a PIN, enter the PIN and press the OK soft key. For further details, see "Change PIN" on page 152.

The phone searches for your network and after finding it, the idle screen displays. Now, you can make or receive a call.


Note: The display language is preset to English at the factory. To change the language, use the Language menu (Menu 9.4). For further details, see "Language" on page 151.
5. When you wish to switch the phone off, press and hold the
$\boldsymbol{\sim} / \mathbb{C}$ key until the power-off image displays.

## Call Functions

## Making a Call <br> When the idle screen displays, enter the area code and phone number, and press the $\sim$ key.

Note: When you activate the Auto Redial option in the Extra Settings menu (Menu 9.6), the phone automatically redials up to ten times when the person does not answer the call or is already on the phone.

## Making an International Call

1. Press and hold the $0+$ key.

The + character appears.
2. Enter the country code, area code, and phone number and press the $\rightarrow$ key.

## Ending a Call

When you want to finish your call, briefly press the $\boldsymbol{\sim}$ / © key.

## Redialing the Last Number

The phone stores the numbers you dialed, received or missed if the caller is identified. See "Recent Calls" on page 63 for further details.
To recall any of these numbers:

1. If you have typed characters on the display, press the $\boldsymbol{\Omega} / \mathbb{C}$ key to return to Idle mode.
2. Press the key to display a list of the last numbers in the order you made or received.

3. Use the Up and Down keys to scroll through the numbers until the number you want highlights.

## Making a Call from Phonebook

You can store frequently used phone numbers in the SIM card or the phone's memory, which are collectively called Phonebook. Simply select a name to recall the associated number. For further details about the Phonebook features, see page 33.

## Adjusting the Volume

During a call, if you want to adjust the earpiece volume, use the Volume keys on the left side of the phone.

Press the $\wedge$ key to increase the volume level and the $\checkmark$ key to decrease the level.


In Idle mode, you can also adjust the keypad tone volume using these keys.

## Answering a Call

When somebody calls you, the phone rings and displays the incoming call animation.
When the caller can be identified, the caller's phone number, or name if stored in your Phonebook, displays.

1. If necessary, open the folder. Press the key or the Accept soft key to answer the incoming call.
If the Anykey Answer option in the Extra Settings menu (Menu 9.6) is activated, you can press any key to answer a call except for the $\boldsymbol{\sim} / \mathbb{C}$ key and the Reject soft key.
If the Open to Answer option in the Extra Settings menu (Menu 9.6) is activated, you can answer the call simply by opening the folder.

Call Functions

Note: To reject an incoming call, press and hold the Volume keys on the left side of the phone before opening the folder, or press the Reject soft key or $\boldsymbol{\Omega} / \mathbb{C}$ key.
2. End the call by closing the folder or pressing the $\boldsymbol{\sim} / \mathbb{C}$ key.

Note: You can answer a call while using the Phonebook or menu features.

## Viewing Missed Calls

When you are unable to answer a call for any reason, you can find out who is calling you, if this service is available, so that you can call the person back.
The number of calls you missed displays on the idle screen immediately after a call is missed.
To view the missed call immediately:

1. If the phone is closed, open the folder.
2. Press the View soft key.

The number corresponding to the most recent missed call displays, if available.

## Editing a Missed Call Number

Note: When the number corresponding to the missed call is not available, the Edit option does not display.
3. Press the Options soft key.
4. Press the Up or Down key to highlight the Edit option.
5. Press the Select soft key.
6. Change the number.

## Deleting a Missed Call

1. Press the Options soft key.
2. If necessary, press the Up or Down key to highlight the Delete option.
3. Press the Select soft key.

You can press the $\boldsymbol{\sim} / \mathbb{C}$ key at any time to exit the Missed Call feature.

Note: You can access the Missed Call feature at any time by selecting the Missed Calls menu (Menu 1.1).

## Quickly Switching to Silent Mode

Silent mode is convenient when you wish to stop the phone from making noise，in a theater for example．
In Idle mode，press and hold the \＃key until the＂Silent Mode＂message and the Vibration icon（呮）display． In Silent Mode，instead of sounds，your phone will vibrate， flash its＇light，or do nothing depending on the function and situation．
To exit and reactivate the previous sound settings，press and hold the \＃key again until the＂Exit Silent Mode＂ appears．The Vibration icon 误 no longer displays． While in Silent mode，your phone changes the sound settings as follows：

To exit and reactivate the previous sound settings，press and hold the \＃key again until＂Exit Silent Mode＂appears． The Vibration icon（埙）no longer displays．

## Selecting Functions and Options

Your phone offers a set of functions that allow you to customize your phone. These functions are arranged in menus and sub-menus, accessed using the two soft keys marked $\vdots$ and $!$. Each menu and sub-menu allows you to view and alter the settings of a particular function.
The roles of the soft keys vary according to the function you are currently using; the label on the bottom line of the display just above each key indicates its current role.


To view the various functions and options available and to select the one you want:

1. Press the appropriate soft key.

In some functions, you may be asked for a password or PIN. Enter the code and press the OK soft key.

Note: When you access a list of options, your phone highlights the current option. If, however, there are only two options, such as On/Off or Enable/ Disable, your phone highlights the option that is not currently active so that you can select it directly.

## Phonebook

You can store phone numbers and their corresponding names in your SIM card and phone＇s memories．They are physically separate but are used as a single entity，called Phonebook．

## Storing a Number with a Name

There are two ways to store a number：
－Using the Save soft key in Idle mode
－Using the New Entry option in the Phonebook menu

## Storing a Number in Idle Mode

When you enter a number，Save appears above the left soft key to allow you to store the number in Phonebook．

1．Enter the number you want to store．
Note：If you make a mistake while entering a number，correct it using the（C）key．

2．To save the number，press the Save soft key．
3．Select an icon to identify the category of the number to be stored．Three categories are available：

- 回：Mobile phone number
- 俄：Office number
- 造：Home number

To select the category，press the Left or Right key and press the Select soft key．

4．Choose either SIM Memory or Phone Memory to store the number．

5．Enter a name and press the OK soft key．

The maximum length you can enter for a name depends on your SIM card.

Note: When you change phones, any numbers stored in your SIM card memory are automatically available with the new phone, whereas any numbers stored in the phone's memory must be reentered.
6. Press the OK soft key to store the name and number. The new Phonebook entry displays.

## Storing a Number Using the Phonebook Menu

1. At the idle screen, press the Name soft key.
2. Scroll to New Entry by pressing the Up or Down key and press the Select soft key.
3. Select an icon to identify the category of the number to be stored by pressing the Left or Right key, and press the Select soft key.

Note: The E-mail icon is available in this step. It allows you to save an Email address instead of a phone number.
4. Choose either SIM Memory or Phone Memory to store the number.
5. Enter a name and press the OK soft key.

The maximum length of a name depends on your SIM card.
Phonebook
6. Enter a number or address you want to store and press the Save soft key.

## Using Phonebook Entry Options

While accessing any Phonebook entry, press the Options soft key to use the options for the entry.

The following options are available:
Paste: allows you to paste the number into the normal dialing mode. Use this option to dial a number similar to one in Phonebook, such as a different extension in the same office.
Use the $\square$ key to change the number as required; see page 24 for further details. When you are ready to dial, press the $\sim$ key.
Edit: allows you to edit the name and/or number.
Photo Caller ID: allows you to select or take a photo to use for a name or number.
Delete: allows you to erase the name and number from Phonebook. You are asked to confirm that you wish to erase the name and number by pressing the Yes soft key. Copy: allows you to copy the number to another location. You can select the memory and the location number.

Caller Group: allows you to organize your Phonebook entry in caller groups so that the phone alerts you in a specific way when a person from one of your groups calls you. Select one of the ten groups available.
To remove an entry from a group, select the No Group option.
For more information about how to change caller group properties, see page 38.
Add Entry: allows you to add a new number to the currently selected name.

## Searching for and Dialing a Number in Phonebook

 After storing numbers in Phonebook, you can search for them in two ways; by name and by caller group.
## Searching for a Number by Name

1. At the idle screen, press the Name soft key.
2. Press the Select soft key when Search highlights. You are asked to enter a name.
3. Enter the first few letters of the name.

The Phonebook entries are listed, starting with the first entry matching your input.

4. Once you have found the entry, press the $\curvearrowleft$ key to dial the number, or press the Options soft key to access the Phonebook entry options; for further details, see page 35.

## Searching for a Number by Caller Group

1. When the idle screen displays, press the Name soft key.
2. Scroll to Group Search by pressing the Up or Down key and press the Select soft key. You are asked to enter a group name.
3. Enter the first few letters of the group name that you wish to find.

The caller groups are listed, starting with the first group matching your input.
4. Scroll to the group you want by pressing the Up or Down key and press the View soft key.
The Phonebook entries in the caller group are listed.

5. Once you have found the entry, press the $\curvearrowleft$ key to dial the number, or press the Options soft key to access the Phonebook entry options; for further details, see page 35.

## Editing a Caller Group

6. When the idle screen displays, press the Name soft key.
7. Scroll to Group Edit by pressing the Up or Down key and press the Select soft key.
8. Scroll through the group list by pressing the Up or Down key.
9. When the group you want highlights, press the Options soft key.
10. Select each option and change the settings, as required. The following options are available:

- Call Ring Tone: allows you to set the ring tone to be used when you receive a voice call from a person in the group.
- SMS Tone: allows you to set the ring tone to be used when you receive a text message from a person in the group.
- Graphic: allows you to set the graphic icon to be displayed when you receive a voice call from a person in the group.
- Group Name: allows you to assign a name to the group. For further details about how to enter characters, see page 43.

11. When you are finished, press the $\square$ or $\boldsymbol{\Omega}^{\mathbb{C}}$ key.

## Speed-dialing

Once you have stored phone numbers in the SIM card, you can set up to eight speed-dial entries and then dial them easily whenever you want, simply by pressing the associated number key.

## Setting Up Speed-dial Entries

1. At the idle screen, press the Name soft key.
2. Scroll to Speed Dial by pressing the Up or Down key and press the Select soft key.
3. Select the key to which you wish to assign the speed-dialing number, from the $2 *=$ - 9 mm keys, and press the OK soft key.

Note: Memory location 1 is reserved for your Voice Mail server number.
If you have already assigned a number to the key, the Options soft key replaces the OK soft key. Go to step 6.
4. Select a Phonebook entry and press the View soft key.
5. Select a number if the entry has more than one number, by pressing the Up or Down key and press the Select soft key.
6. Once you have assigned a number to the selected key, you can use the following options by pressing the Options soft key:

- Change: allows you to assign a different number to the key.
- Delete: allows you to clear the setting so that no number is assigned to the key.
- Delete All: allows you to clear the settings for all keys so that no numbers are assigned to any of the keys.
- Number: allows you to view the number assigned to the key.

7. When you are finished, press the © or $\mathbb{C}$ key.

## Speed-dialing from Phonebook

To speed-dial the numbers assigned to keys $\left[\begin{array}{l}2 \times \pi \\ \text { to } \\ \text {, }\end{array}\right.$ press and hold the appropriate key.

## Checking the Memory Status

You can check how many names and numbers are stored in Phonebook; SIM card and phone memories. You can also see the capacity of both memories.
8. When the idle screen displays, press the Name soft key.
9. Select the Memory Status option.
10. Press the Up or Down key to view the number of existing and remaining entries in the card and phone's memory.
11. When you are finished, press the $\square$ or $\boldsymbol{\sim}$ / key.

## Deleting All of the Phone Book Entries

You can delete all of your entries from your phone's memory, your SIM card or both.

1. When the idle screen displays, press the Name soft key.
2. Scroll to Delete All by pressing the Up or Down key and press the Select soft key or $\ddot{\chi}$ key.
3. To place a check mark by the memory location you want to empty, All, SIM Memory, or Phone Memory, press the $\underset{\chi}{ }$ key. You can remove the check mark by pressing the $\underset{\chi}{ }$ key again.
4. Press the Delete soft key to delete the entries in the selected memory location.
5. Enter the phone password and press the OK soft key or $\ddot{\chi}$ key.

Note: The password is preset to " 00000000 " at the factory.
To change this password, see "Change Password" on page 153.
6. When the confirmation message appears, press the Yes soft key or $\ddot{\chi}$ key.
To cancel the deletion, press the No soft key.
7. When you have finished, press the C or (end) key.

## Using the Service Dialing Numbers

You can view the list of Service Dialing Numbers (SDN) assigned by your service provider. These numbers include emergency numbers, directory enquiries and voice mail numbers.

1. When the idle screen displays, press the Name soft key.
2. Select the SDN option by pressing the Up or Down key and press the Select soft key or(C) key.
3. To dial the number displayed, press the Dial soft key, (SEND)key, or (C)key.

## Entering Text

When using your phone, you often need to enter text, such as when storing a name in Phonebook, creating your personal greeting or scheduling events on your calendar. You can enter alphanumeric characters by using your phone's keypad.
Your phone has the following text input modes:

- T9 mode

This mode allows you to enter words with only one keystroke per letter. Each key on the keypad has more than one letter; for example, when you press the 50 key once, J, K or L displays. The T9 mode automatically compares your keystrokes with an internal linguistic dictionary to determine the correct word, thus requiring far fewer keystrokes than the traditional upper/lower-case character modes.

- Upper/lower-case character modes

These modes allow you to enter letters by pressing the key labeled with the letter you want to enter once, twice, three or four times until the letter displays.

- Symbol mode

This mode allows you to enter symbols, such as punctuation marks.

- Number mode

This mode allows you to enter numbers.

## Changing the Text Input Mode

When you are in a field that allows characters to be entered, you will notice the text input mode indicator on the display.
Example: Writing a text message

## Using T9 Mode

T9 is a predictive text input mode that allows you to key in any character using single keystrokes. This text input mode is based on a built-in dictionary.
To enter a word in T9 mode:

1. When you are in T9 mode, start entering a word by pressing the 2uk to gmive keys. Press each key only once for each letter.

Example: To enter "Hello" in T9 mode, press the (40), 300), (50), 5* and 60) keys.

The word you are typing appears on the display. It may change with each key that you press.
2. Enter the whole word before editing or deleting the keystrokes.
3. When the word displays correctly, go to step 4.

If not, press the ${ }^{(0+1}$, Up or Down key to display alternative word choices for the keys that you have pressed.
Example: Both "Of" and "Me" have the 6 and ( $\mathrm{B}^{\circ \mathrm{D}}$ keys. The phone displays the most commonly used choice tirst.
4. Put a space by pressing the \# key and start entering the next word.

- To type words not found in T9 mode, change the text input mode to the upper/lower-case character input mode.
- To enter full stops, hyphens or apostrophes, press the (100) key. T9 mode applies grammar rules to ensure that the correct punctuation is used.

Example: The (100) key is used twice to display two punctuation marks:

$\checkmark$ To shift the case in T9 mode, use the $*$ key. There are


- You can move the cursor by using the Left and Right keys. To delete letters, press the $\square$ key. Press and hold the $\square$ key to clear the display.


## To Add a New Word into the T9 Dictionary

1. After pressing the keys corresponding to the word you want to add, press the $\mathbf{0}$ key or Up or Down key to display the alternative words.
2. When you press the $\mathbf{0}$ key or Up or Down key at the last alternative word, the display shows Add on the bottom line. Press the Add soft key or the $\chi$ key .
3. If necessary, clear the word using the $\mathbf{C}$ key and enter the word you want to add using Alphabet mode.
4. Press the OK soft key or the $\ddot{\chi}$ key.

The word is added to the T9 dictionary and becomes the first word for the associated keypress series.

## Using the Upper/Lower-Case Alphabet Mode Use the (100) to ${ }^{\circ+1}$ keys to enter your text.

1. Press the key labeled with the letter you want:

- Once for the first letter
- Twice for the second letter


## Entering Text

2. Select the other letters in the same way.

Note: The cursor moves to the right when you press a different key. When entering the same letter twice or a different letter on the same key, just wait for a few seconds for the cursor to move to the right automatically, and then select the next letter.

- To insert a space, press the \# key.
- You can move the cursor by using the Left and Right keys. To delete letters, press the $\square$ key. Press and hold the $\square$ key to clear the display.


## Using Number Mode

Number mode enables you to enter numbers into a text message. Press the keys corresponding to the digits you want to enter.

## Using Symbol Mode

Symbol mode enables you to insert symbols into a text message.

## Options During a Call

Your phone provides a number of control functions that you can use during a call.

## Putting a Call on Hold

You can place the current call on hold whenever you want.
You can make another call while you have a call in
progress if your network supports this service.
To place a call on hold, simply press the Hold soft key. You can reactivate the call whenever you want, by pressing the Unhold soft key.
To make a call while you have a call in progress:

1. Enter the phone number that you wish to dial or look it up in Phonebook.
2. Press the key to dial the second call.

The first call is automatically put on hold.
Or

1. Put the current call on hold by pressing the Hold soft key.
2. Make the second call in the normal way.

To switch between the two calls, simply press the Swap soft key.
The current call is placed on hold and the call on hold is reactivated so that you can continue conversing with the other party.
When you want to finish, end each call normally by pressing the $\boldsymbol{\sim} / \mathbb{C}$ key.

## Switching the Microphone Off (Mute)

You can temporarily switch your phone's microphone off, so that the other party cannot hear you.
Example: You wish to say something to another person in the room but do not want the person on the phone to hear you.
To switch the microphone off temporarily:

1. Press the Options soft key.
2. If necessary, press the Down key to highlight the Mute option.
3. Press the OK soft key. The other person can no longer hear you.

To switch the microphone back on:

1. Press the Options soft key.
2. If necessary, press the Down key to highlight the Unmute option.
3. Press the OK soft key. The other person can hear you again.

## Muting/Sending Key Tones

These options allow you to turn the key tones off or on. If the Mute keys option is selected, your phone does not transmit the key tones. It allows you to press keys without hearing annoying key tones during a call.

Note: To communicate with answering machines or computerized telephone systems, the Mute keys option must be selected.

## Sending Tones

This option allows you to send the correct type of tones if you need to enter a password or account number when
calling an automated system, such as a bank. To send tones:

1. Press the Options soft key.
2. Highlight the Send DTMF option.
3. Press the OK soft key.
4. Enter the required number and press the OK soft key.

## Searching for a Number in Phonebook

You can search for a number in Phonebook during a call.

1. Press the Options soft key.
2. Press the Down key to highlight the Phonebook option.
3. Press the OK soft key.

The Phonebook entries are listed.
4. Enter the name that you wish to find.

If you enter the first few letters of the name, the Phonebook entries are listed, starting with the first entry matching your input.
5. To view the highlighted entry, press the View soft key.

For further details about the Phonebook feature, see "Phonebook" on page 33.

## Call Waiting

You can answer an incoming call while you have a call in progress, if this service is supported by the network and you have set the Call Waiting menu (Menu 3.3) to
Activate; see "Call Waiting" on page 104. You are notified of an incoming call by a call waiting tone.
To answer a call while you have a call in progress:

1. Press the key to answer the incoming call. The first call is automatically put on hold.
2. To switch between the two calls, press the Swap soft key.
3. To end a call on hold, press the Options soft key and select the End Held Call option.

To end the current call, press the $\mathbf{m} / \mathbb{C}$ key.

## Making a Multi-party Call

A multi-party call is a network service that allows up to six people to take part simultaneously in a multi-party or conference call.
For further details about subscribing to this service, contact your service provider.

## Setting up the Multi-party Call

1. Call the first participant in the normal way.
2. Call the second participant in the normal way. The first call is automatically put on hold.
3. To join the first participant to the multi-party call, press the Options soft key and select Join. Press the OK soft key.
4. To add a new person to the multi-party call, call the person in the normal way and then press the Options soft key. Select the Conference option and press the OK soft key.
You can add incoming callers by answering the call and pressing the Options soft key, and selecting Conference. Repeat as required.

## Having a Private Conversation With One Participant

1. Press the Options soft key and choose the Select one option. Press the OK soft key.

Options During a Call

The list of call participants appears.
2. Highlight a person by pressing the Up or Down key, and press the Select soft key or the $\sim$ key.
3. When the Private option highlights, press the OK soft key. Now you can talk privately to that person. The other participants can continue to converse with each other.
4. To return to the multi-party call, press the Options soft key and select Conference. Press the OK soft key.

All of the multi-party call participants can now hear each other.

## Dropping One Participant

1. Press the Options soft key and choose the Select one option. Press the OK soft key.
The list of call participants appears.
2. Highlight a person by pressing the Up or Down key, and press the Select soft key or the $\sim$ key.
3. Press the Down key to select the Remove option and press the OK soft key.

The call ends with that participant, but you can continue to talk to the other participants.
4. When you want to end the multi-party call, close the folder or press the $\boldsymbol{\sim} / \mathbb{C}$ key.

## Using the Menus

You can tailor the phone's range of functions to your needs using menus and sub-menus. Menus and sub-menus can be accessed by scrolling using the Navigation keys or by using the shortcuts.

## Accessing a Menu Function by Scrolling

1. In Idle mode, press the Menu soft key.
2. Scroll using the navigation keys to reach a main menu, Phone Settings for example. Press the Select soft key or the $\ddot{\chi}$ key to enter the menu.
3. If the menu contains sub-menus, Language for example, you can access them by scrolling and pressing the Select soft key or the $\dot{\chi}$ key.
If the menu that you have selected contains further options, repeat this step.

Using the Menus

## Recent Calls

In this menu, you can view and edit the:

- calls you missed, received or made.
- voice mail
- length of your calls.
- cost of your calls.

Note: You can access the numbers in the three types of call records by pressing the key in Idle mode.

## Missed Calls

This menu lets you view the numbers of the last 20 unanswered calls.
The number and name, if available, display together with the date and time when the call was received.
By pressing the Options soft key, you can:

- edit the number, if available, and save it in Phonebook.
- delete the call from the list.

You can also dial the number by pressing the $\Omega$ key.

## Calls Received

This menu lets you view the last 20 numbers of the calls you answered.
The number and name, if available, display, together with the date and time when the call was received.
By pressing the Options soft key, you can:

- edit the number, if available, and save it in Phonebook.
- delete the call from the list.

You can also dial the number by pressing the $\sim$ key.

## Calls Made

This menu lets you view the last 20 numbers you dialed.
The number and name display, together with the date and time when the call was made.
By pressing the Options soft key or the $\underset{\chi}{ }$ key, you can:

- delete the number.
- edit the number and save it in Phonebook.

You can also dial the number by pressing the $\sim$ key.

## Voice Mail

This menu provides you with a way of accessing your voice mailbox, if provided by your network.
The following options are available:
Connect to Voice Mail: before using the Voice Mail feature, you must enter the voice server number obtained from your service provider. You can then select this option and press the OK soft key or the $\ddot{\chi}$ key to listen to your messages.
You can connect to the voice server by pressing and holding the ( ${ }^{100}$ key in Idle mode.
Voice Mail Number: allows you to change the voice mail server number, if necessary.
Note: Voice Mail is a network feature. Please contact your service provider for further details.

## Delete All

You can delete all of the numbers stored in each call record category.
Select a call record using the Up or Down key and press the Delete soft key. When a confirming message appears, press the Yes soft key.

## Call Time

This menu lets you view the timers for calls you made and received.

Note: The actual time invoiced for calls by your service provider may vary, depending on network features, such as rounding-off for billing purposes.

The following options are available:
Last Call: length of the last call.
Total Made: total length of all calls you made since the timer was last reset.
Total Received: total length of all calls you received since the timer was last reset.
Reset Timers: option used to reset the call timers. You must first enter the phone password and then press the OK soft key.

Note: The password is preset to "00000000." To change this password, see "Change Password" on page 153.

## Messaging

In this menu, the following menu options are explained:

- Text Messages
- Multimedia Messages
- Instant Messages (IM)
- E-mail Messages
- Push Messages


## Text Messages

Short Message Service (SMS) allows you to send and receive short text messages to and from other GSM mobile phones. In addition, your phone supports the Enhanced Messaging Service (EMS), which enables you to include simple pictures, melodies, and animated images in your messages. To use this feature, you must subscribe to your service provider's message service.

1. When the Message icon (国) appears, you have received new text messages. When the memory is full, an error message displays and you cannot receive any new messages. Use the Delete option in each message box to delete obsolete messages.

## Inbox

This message box is used to store the messages that you have received.
When you enter this menu, the list of messages displays with the senders' phone numbers or names, if available in your Phonebook.

1. Select a message from the list and press the View soft key or the $\ddot{\chi}$ key to read the message contents.
2. To scroll through the contents, press the Up or Down key.
3. To scroll to the previous message press the $*$ key or press the \# key for the next message.
While reading a message, you can choose the following options by pressing the Options soft key or the $\ddot{\chi}$ key: Delete: allows you to delete the message.
Forward: allows you to resend the message. For further information about how to send a message, see page 70. Reply: allows you to reply to the sender by sending a text message.
Call Back: allows you to call the sender back.
Save Address: allows you to extract the sender's number and URL, e-mail addresses or phone numbers from the message text, so that you can save them in your phone's memory.
Move to Phone: allows you to move the message to from the SIM card to the phone's memory. This option is only available for messages stored in the SIM card.
Move to SIM: allows you to move the message from the phone's memory to the SIM card. This option is only available for messages stored in the phone's memory. Select Objects: allows you to save media items, such as sounds or images, from the message into your phone's memory. You can then use the items when writing a message. For details, see page 71.

## Outbox

This message box is used to store the messages that you have already sent or will send.

Messaging

When you enter this menu, the list of messages in the box displays with the recipients' phone numbers or names, if available in your Phonebook.

1. Select a message from the list and press the View soft key or the $\ddot{\chi}$ key to read the message contents.
2. To scroll through the contents, press the Up or Down key.
3. To scroll to the previous message press the $*$ key or press the \# key for the next message.

While reading a message, you can choose the following options by pressing the Options soft key or the $\ddot{\chi}$ key: Delete: allows you to delete the message.
Send: allows you to resend the message. For further information about how to send a message, see page 70 .
Save Address: allows you to extract the destination number and URL, e-mail addresses or phone numbers from the message text, so that you can save them in your phone's memory.
Move to Phone: allows you to move the message to another memory location, from the SIM card to the phone's memory or vice versa.
Select Objects: allows you to save the media items, such as sounds or images, from the message into your phone's memory. You can then use the items when writing a message. For details, see page 71.

## Write New

In this menu, you can write and send a text message.

Note: When you add media items to the message, the number of characters you can enter decreases.

## Creating a Simple Text Message

1. Create your message.

For more information about entering characters, see "Entering Text" on page 43.
2. When you finish entering your message, press the Options soft key or the $\ddot{\chi}$ key. The following options are available:

- Send Only: allows you to send the message. The message is deleted after sending.
- Save and Send: allows you to save a copy of the message to the Outbox and then send the message.
- Save Only: allows you to save the message in the Outbox so that it can be sent later.
- For more information about the Text Formatting, Add Objects, Add Templates, Add Phonebook, Add Bookmark and Language options, see page 71.

3. Select Send Only or Save and Send, and press the Select soft key or the $\underset{\chi}{ }$ key.
If you only want to save the message, select Save Only. After saving the message, the phone returns to the Text Messages menu.
4. If you select a save option, select a location and press the OK soft key or the $\ddot{\chi}$ key.
5. If you select the Save and Send option, enter a destination number and press the OK soft key or the $\underset{\chi}{ }$ key. The message is sent.

Note: When the phone fails to send the message, it asks you if you want to retry.
6. Press the OK soft key or the $\underset{\chi}{ }$ key to confirm. Otherwise, press the Exit soft key to return to the text message screen.

## Creating a Message Using the Options

1. Create your message.
2. Press the Options soft key or the $\ddot{X}$ key.
3. Select one of the following options by using the Up and Down keys and pressing the Select soft key or the $\underset{\chi}{ }$ key.

- Text Formatting: allows you to format the style of the text.
- For the Size attribute, Normal, Large and Small sizes are available. For the Underline and Strikethrough attributes, select On or Off.
The attributes can be combined.
- Add Objects: allows you to add a sound, melody, picture or animated image to your message. Select the category of the item to be added. In each category, you can select from the various factory-set items or choose an item received from other sources, such as the Internet or other phones.

Note: When you add media items to a message, the number of characters you can enter decreases.

- Add Templates: allows you to apply one of the preset message templates to the text. Select one of the five messages stored in the Templates menu. For further details, see page 72.
- Add Phonebook: allows you to add a Phonebook entry to your message. Select one from the list.
- Add Bookmark: allows you to add a web page's address stored in your Favorite list. Select one from the list.
- Language: allows you to change the language to be used in T9 input mode. Select the language to be used.

4. Complete the message, and send or save it by following the procedure from step 2 on page 70 .

## Templates

Using this menu, you can preset messages that you use most frequently.
Select an empty location or the message template you want and press the Options soft key or the $\underset{\chi}{ }$ key.
The following options are available:
Edit: allows you to write a new message or edit the message.

Note: For further details about how to enter characters, see "Entering Text" on page 43.

Send Message: allows you to retrieve the message. Once you have completed the message, you can send, save and send, or simply save it. For details about how to send a message, see page 69.
Delete: allows you to delete the message. You are asked to confirm the deletion by pressing the Yes soft key or the ※ key.

## Settings

In this menu, you can set up default message information. A setting group is a collection of settings required to send messages. The number of setting groups available depends on the capacity of your SIM card.

Note: The last setting you accessed is automatically activated for sending messages.

Service Center: allows you to store or change the number of your message center, which is required when sending messages. You must obtain this number from your service provider.
Default Destination: allows you to store the default destination number. The number automatically displays on the Destination screen when you create a message. Default Type: allows you to set the default message type to Text, Fax, E-mail or Paging. The network can convert the messages into the selected format.
Default Validity: allows you to set the length of time your text messages are stored at the message center while attempts are made to deliver them.
Setting Name: allows you to give a name to the setting group currently being defined.
Setting $\mathbf{x}$ (where $\mathbf{x}$ is the setting group number): each group has its own sub-menu.
Common Setting: The following options are available: Reply Path: allows the recipient of your message to send you a reply message using your message center, if your network supports this service.
Delivery Reports: allows you to activate or deactivate the report function. When this function is activated, the network informs you whether or not your message has been delivered.
Bearer Selection: allows you to choose either GSM or GPRS, depending on your network.
Character Support: allows you to choose a character type from GSM-Alphabet, Uni-Code or Automatic. If you
select Uni-Code and your recipient's phone does not support it, your recipient may not be able to read your message.

## Delete All

This menu allows you to delete all of the text messages in each message box. You can also delete all of your messages at one time.

When a confirming message displays, press the Yes soft key $\chi$ key to confirm.

## Memory Status

You can check how many messages are currently s This menu shows how many messages are currently stored in the SIM Memory, PHONE Memory, and CB (Cell Broadcast) Memory.
To delete messages in each message box, use the Delete All option.

## Broadcast

This network service allows you to receive text messages on various topics, such as the weather or traffic. Cell Broadcasting (CB) messages display as soon as they are received, provided that:
the phone is in Idle mode.

- the Receive option is set to Enable.
- the message channel is currently active on the channel list.
The following options are available:
Read: lets you view the message. While reading a message, press the Save soft key to store the message in the Archive box for later retrieval. Volatile displays the messages from the network, but loses its contents as soon as the phone is switched off. Scroll through the message using the Up and Down keys.
Receive: allows you to enable or disable the reception of broadcast messages.
Channel List: allows you to indicate the channels from which you wish to receive cell broadcast messages. The following options are available:
Select: used to enable or disable channels on the list by marking or unmarking them respectively.
Add Channel: used to enter the ID and title for a new channel.
Delete: used to remove a channel from the list.
Edit: used to change the ID and title of an existing channel.
Language: allows you to select your preferred language to be used when displaying cell broadcast messages.

Please contact your service provider for more information.

## Multimedia Messages

Multimedia Message Service (MMS) is a messaging service very similar to Short Message Service (SMS). It provides automatic and immediate delivery of personal multimedia messages from phone to phone or from phone to e-mail. In addition to the familiar text content of text messages, multimedia messages can contain images and graphics. An MMS message is a multimedia presentation in a single entry. It is not a text file with attachments. Using the MMS feature, your phone can receive multimedia messages. You can also send picture messages, which are short messages that contain images, such as your photos or graphics you downloaded from the Internet. This function is available only if it is supported by your service provider. Only phones that offer picture message features can receive and display picture messages.

## Inbox

## Viewing a Message When You Receive it

When a new multimedia message comes in, the display shows the text notification along with the sender's number.

1. Press the View soft key to view the message.

The display shows brief information about the message, such as the sender's number, the message size and the subject. If you want to view the message later in the Inbox, press the Exit soft key.
2. To scroll through the message information, press the Up or Down key.

Messaging

While viewing the information, press the Options soft key to use the following options:
If you are viewing a new message, the options are the same as when you view a message as soon as you receive it.
When you are reviewing message, the following options are available:
Delete: deletes the message.
Reply: allows you to reply to the sender by sending a text or picture message.
Call Back: all you to reply to the sender by sending a text or picture message.
Save Address: allows you to extract a number from the message text, so that you can call the number or save it in the Phonebook.
Forward: allows you to forward the message to another person.
Save Picture: allows you to save an image from the message into your phone. Photos are stored in the My Photos folder and other images are in the Pictures folder in the Downloads menu.
Save Sound: allows you to save a sound from the message into the Sounds folder in the Downloads menu.

## Viewing a Received Message in the Inbox

When you access the Inbox menu option, the list of multimedia messages you received displays with the senders' phone numbers, if they are available in your Phonebook, or subjects.

1. Select a message and press the Select soft key to view the message.
2. To scroll through the message, press the Up or Down key.

While viewing a message, you can choose the Message options by pressing the Options soft key.
If you are viewing a new message, the options are the same as when you view a message as soon as you receive it. See the previous section.
When you are reviewing a message, the following options are available:
Delete: deletes the message.
Reply: allows you to reply to the sender by sending a text or picture message.
Callback: allows you to call the sender back.
Save Address: allows you to extract the origination number from the message, so that you can call the number or save it in your Phonebook.
Forward: allows you to forward the message to another person.

## Outbox

When you access this menu option, the list of the picture messages you sent or saved displays.

1. Select a message and press the Select soft key to view the message contents.
2. To scroll through the message, press the Up or Down key.

While viewing a message, you can choose the following options by pressing the Options soft key:
Delete: deletes the message.

Save Address: allows you to extract the destination number from the message, so that you can call the number save it in your Phonebook.
Send: allows you to resend the message.
Edit Message: allows you to change the message contents, sound, picture or text.
Information: displays status, subject, from, message size, to, and date the message was created and sent.

## Shop Multimedia

This option allows you to access the Cingular website to purchase additional multi-media messages (MMS).

## Draft

This menu option allows you to create a message and save it as a draft to send at a later time.
For further details about viewing a message, see "Outbox" on page 68.

## Write New

This menu option allows you to create a new picture message and then send it to multiple destinations.

## Templates

Using this menu, you can preset messages that you use most frequently.
Select an empty location or the message template you want and press the Options soft key.
The following options are available:

Edit: allows you to write a new message or edit the message.
Delete: allows you to delete any templates that you have created or saved.

Note: For further details about how to enter characters, see "Entering Text" on page 43.

## Creating and Sending a Picture Message

1. Enter the subject of your message and press the OK soft key or the $\chi$ key.
2. When Add Here highlights, press the Options soft key or the ※ key and add the message contents using one of the following options:

Add Text: Enter the message text and press the OK soft key or the $\chi$ key.
Add My Photo: allows you to select and add a photo that you have previously taken.
Add Picture: allows you to add a picture stored in the Pictures folder in the Downloads menu. Choose a picture and press the Select soft key.
Add Sound: allows you to record a new sound or choose from the sound list you have created from the Downloads menu. Choose a sound and press the Select soft key
Send: allows you to send the message. Use this option when you finish creating the message. This option is activated after you add a content to the message.
Save: allows you to save the message in the Outbox so that it can be sent later.

Messaging

Settings: allows you to view delivery report, read reply, expiry date, delivery time and priority information about the message.
Add Destination: allows you to enter the phone number, e-mail address, or phone book information to send the message.
Preview: allows you to preview the message before you press send.
3. When the added content displays, press the Down key to highlight Add Here.
4. Repeat steps 2 and 3 until you finish creating your message.
5. If you want to change the added items, press the Up or Down key to highlight one and press the Options soft key. The following options are available:

Edit: allows you to change text or replace the image with another one.
Delete: deletes the item from your message.
Send: allows you to send the message.
Save: allows you to save the message in the Outbox so that it can be sent later.
Add destination: allows you to add the destination for the message.
Preview: allows you to preview the message before you press send.
6. When you finish creating the message, select Send from the options.
7. Choose one of the following options and press the Select soft key:

Phone Number: allows you to enter the phone number you want.
E-mail Address: allows you to enter the e-mail address of the recipient to send the message as an e-mail.

- Phone Book: allows you to recall a number from your Phonebook.

8. Enter a number or an e-mail address, or select a number in Phonebook. When the correct number or address is displayed, press the OK soft key.
9. If you want to send the message to multiple destinations, select Add Destination and press the Select soft key.
10. Repeat steps 7 to 10 . You can enter up to 11 destinations.
11. After entering the destinations, press the Select soft key when Send Message highlights.
12. If you want to edit the destinations, select one and press the Select soft key. You can change or delete it.
13. When you are finished entering the destinations, select Send Message and press the Select soft key. Your phone sends the message.

## Templates

This menu option stores messages you saved as templates so that you can use them to make templates.

1. Scroll through the template list using the Up and Down keys.
2. When the message template you want highlights, press the Select soft key or the $\ddot{\chi}$ key.
3. Press the OK soft key or the $\underset{\chi}{ }$ key to access the following options, or the display automatically shows the options after a specified time:

- Edit: allows you to send a message using the template. For more details about how to send a message, see "Write New" on page 69.
- Delete: allows you to delete the message template. You are asked to confirm the deleteion by pressing the Yes soft key or the $\ddot{\chi}$ key.

4. Press the $\boldsymbol{\sim} \mathbb{C}$ key to return to Idle mode.

## Delete All

This menu allows you to delete all of the multimedia messages in each message box. You can also delete all of your messages at one time.

## Memory Status

You can check the amount of memory being used and the memory remaining for multimedia messages.
The display shows the total space, including the free and used space. It also shows how much space is currently occupied by each message box when you press the Next soft key.

## Setup

You can change the default message settings.
Turn a give option on or off, press the Select soft key to place or remove a check mark on each option
The following options are available:
Delivery Report: When this option is checked, the network informs you whether or not your message has been delivered.
Read Reply: When this option is checked, your phone sends a request for a reply along with your message to the recipient.
Auto Download: When this option is checked, your phone automatically downloads the received pictures or sounds. Message Acceptance: allows you to choose from the message acceptance options. They are all, personal informations, advertisement, and anonymous.
Hide ID: When this option is checked, your phone number is not displayed on the recipient's phone.
Expiry Date: When this option is selected, you can select the expiry time limit you would like the message to display.

## MMS Profile

In this menu, you can configure various settings that are required when you send or receive multimedia messages.
The following options are available:
Profile Name: Name that you wish to assign to the MMS server.
Connection URL: Address of your MMS server.
Security: Data transmission mode. Choose Secure to protect your data against unauthorized access; otherwise, choose Non-Secure.
IP address: Gateway address required to connect to the MMS server.
User name: User ID required to connect to the MMS server.
Password: Password required to connect to the MMS server.
APN: Access point name used for the address of the MMS server. For further details, contact your service provider.

## Instant Messaging (IM)

The instant messaging option allows you to send and receive instant messages using AOL® Instant Messenger ${ }^{\text {TM }}$ service or ICQ®.

## AOL Instant Messenger Service (AIM®)

You must already have an AIM Screen name and password to log in. If you don't have an AIM screen name, you can get one free at www.aim.com.
Follow these easy steps to log in:

1. Scroll right on the navigation key
2. Use the navigation keys to highlight the AIM. Press the Select soft key.
3. Enter your Screen name and Password. Press the Sign on soft key.
4. If the sign-on was successful, you will see Welcome, followed by a list of options.

## Buddy List Group

The first time you sign on to AIM from your phone, a special Buddy List group is created. When you sign back on to AIM from your computer, this list appears as a new group called Mobile Device. You can manage this list using your PC or your phone.

## Send an Instant Message

1. From the AIM main menu, scroll to and select Buddy List.
2. Use the navigation keys to highlight a buddy and press the Select soft key or $\ddot{\chi}$ key.

The following information is listed:
Send IM: This option launches the IM screen for you to begin entering text.
Buddy info: This option provides information about the buddy you have selected. It displays their status, screen name, and client type.
Set Alert: This option sets an alert for the buddy when they have activity on their session. To release the alert, highlight release alert and press the Select soft key.

Block IMs: This option blocks any messages from the buddy you have selected.
Add Buddy: This option allows you to add another AIM user to the conversation.
Delete buddy: This option deletes the selected buddy from your buddy list.
Search: This option allows you to search for an AIM user by their Screen name or E-mail address.

## Menu

The Menu screen provides the following options:

## Conversations

This function displays the conversations that you have active. To select and view a conversation, press the Select soft key or $\underset{\chi}{ }$ key.

## Blocked List

The blocked list shows all buddies that you have blocked from sending you instant messages. The $\$$ icon displays next to the screen name.

## IM Settings

The instant message (IM) settings screen gives you the option to save your password so that you do not have to enter it each time you log on. Use the up and down navigation keys to highlight the option. Press the Select soft key or $\underset{\chi}{ }$ key to save.

## Saved history

This option provides the ability to save the conversations you've had on your phone.

## Exit

This option exits you from the AIM Screen but does not log you off the system.

## Sign Off

This option will sign you off and end all conversations. To sign off, press the OK soft key or $\underset{\chi}{ }$ key. To cancel, press the Cancel soft key.

2. Enter your ICQ number and Password. Press the Connect soft key. The Contact List screen displays with the My Status option highlighted.
3. Press the Select soft key. The following options are displayed.
My Availability: This option allows you to set your availability to Available, Away, or Invisible. Use the Up or Down navigation keys to highlight an option and press the Select soft key.
Add user: This option allows you to enter another user's ICQ \#.

Messaging

To use this feature, you need to subscribe to an e-mail service and set up your e-mail account. For further details, contact your service provider.

## Inbox

This menu allows you to access your e-mail Inbox and read the e-mails you received.

1. Press the Select soft key when Check E-Mail highlights.
2. Select the e-mail account from which you want to retrieve emails and press the Select soft key.

For further details about setting up an e-mail account, see page 97.

The list of e-mails you received displays. The icons on the left tell you the status of each e-mail:

- e: The header hasn't been read.
- e: The header has been read.
- e: The contents have been read.
- Ce: The e-mail has attachments and the contents have been read.
- E: The e-mail has been deleted from both the phone and e-mail server. This icon disappears when you disconnect the phone from the server.

3. Scroll to an e-mail from the list and press the Select soft key.

When the e-mail is not read, the display shows you its header, such as sender's name, e-mail address, Cc address(es), date when the e-mail was sent and subject. If the e-mail has already been read, the display immediately shows you its text. Skip to step 6.
4. Press the Options soft key.

Messaging

## Setup

You can change the default setting options for using the Email feature.

The following options are available:
Account: you can configure up to five e-mail accounts using different service providers. The last account you accessed is automatically activated for sending or receiving e-mails. For each account, the following options are available: Account Name: enter a name for the current account. Connect Name: select one of the profiles set in the Profile menu.
Name: enter the name to be displayed in your outgoing emails as the sender name.
E-Mail Address: enter your e-mail address.
Protocol Type: specify an e-mail protocol type for the incoming server, either POP3 or IMAP4. Contact your email service provider for more information.
For the IMAP4 protocol, you can set whether or not the phone retrieves e-mails with attachments. You can also select the number of e-mail headers you want to retrieve. Incoming Server: enter the IP address or domain name of the server to be used for receiving e-mails. Your e-mail service provider can give you this information.
User ID: enter your e-mail ID.
Password: enter your e-mail password.
Outgoing Server: enter the IP address or domain name of the server to be used for sending e-mails. Your e-mail service provider can give you this information.
Check Interval: allows you to select how often the phone checks the server for incoming e-mails.
Signature: allows you to attach your name, phone number, simple memo or tag line as a signature to your e-mail.

Send Copy to Self: allows you to set whether or not your phone sends a copy of an outgoing e-mail to the e-mail address specified in your account.

## E-Mail Profile

In this menu, you can configure various network settings that are required when you send or receive e-mails.

Note: Your service provider can give you information about each parameter.
If you change the e-mail settings without first checking with your service provider, the E-mail feature may not work properly.
The following options are available for each profile:
Profile Name: enter a name that you wish to assign to the e-mail profile.
Connect Name: enter a descriptive name for the connection.
User Name: enter the user ID required to access the GPRS network.
Password: enter the password required to access the GPRS network.
APN: enter the access point name used for the address of the GPRS network gateway.

## Push Message

This menu option allows you to receive and access web messages from the server.
The following options are available:
Inbox: allows you to read the messages received from the web server.

Receive: allows you to set whether or not your phone receives web messages.
Delete All: allows you to delete all of the web messages.

## Network Services

These menu functions are network services. Please contact your service provider to check their availability and subscribe to them, if you wish.

## Call Forwarding

This network service enables incoming calls to be rerouted to the number that you specify.
Example:You may wish to forward your business calls to a colleague while you are on holiday.
You can use the following options to forward voice calls and/or data calls:
Forward Always: all calls are forwarded.
Busy: calls are forwarded when you are already on another call.
No Reply: calls are forwarded when you do not answer the phone.
Unreachable: calls are forwarded when you are not in an area covered by your service provider.
Cancel All: all call forwarding options are canceled.
To set your call forwarding options:

1. Select a call forwarding option by pressing the Up or Down key and then press the Select soft key.
2. Select the type of calls, voice or data, by pressing the Up or Down key and then press the Select soft key.

The current status displays. If the option has already been set, the number to which the calls are forwarded displays.

The phone sends your settings to the network and the network's acknowledgement displays.
You can deactivate all call forwarding settings by selecting the Cancel All option.

## Call Barring

The call barring network service allows you to restrict your calls.
You can use the following options to restrict voice and/or data calls:
All Outgoing: calls cannot be made.
International: international calls cannot be made.
International Except to Home: when abroad, calls can be made only to numbers within the current country and to your home country, which is the country where your home network provider is located.

Network Services

All Incoming: calls cannot be received.
Incoming While Abroad: calls cannot be received when you are using your phone outside of your home service area.
Cancel All: all call barring settings are deactivated; calls can be made and received normally.
To set your call barring options:
4. Select a call barring option by pressing the Up or Down key and then press the Select soft key.
5. Select the type of calls, voice or data, by pressing the Up or Down key and then press the Select soft key.
6. Press the Activate soft key to confirm your settings.
7. Enter your call barring password supplied by your service provider.

The phone sends your settings to the network and the network's acknowledgement displays.
To deactivate specific call barring settings:
8. Select the call barring option to be deactivated.
9. Select the type of calls to which this option applies.
10. Press the Deactivate soft key.
11. Enter your call barring password supplied by your service provider.

The phone sends your settings to the network and the network's acknowledgement displays
You can also deactivate all call barring settings by selecting the Cancel All option.
Change Barring Password: you can set and change the call barring password obtained from your service provider
using this option. You must enter the current password before you can specify a new one.
Once you have entered a new password, you are asked to confirm it by entering it again.

## Call Waiting

This network service informs you when someone is trying to reach you during another call.
You can specify individual call waiting options for voice calls and/or data calls.
To set your call waiting options:

1. Select the type of calls, voice or data, to which the call waiting option is to be applied by pressing the Up or Down key and then press the Select soft key.

The screen informs you whether call waiting is activated or deactivated.
2. You can activate or deactivate the call waiting feature using the Activate or Deactivate soft key respectively.

To return to the previous screen, press the Exit soft key.
You can also deactivate all call waiting settings by selecting the Cancel All option.

## Network Selection

The Network Selection feature enables you to automatically or manually select the network used when roaming outside of your home area.

Note: You can select a network other than your home network only if there is a valid roaming agreement between them.

To indicate to automatically or manually select the network when roaming:

Network Services

1. When Network Selection displays, press the Select soft key.
2. Press the Up or Down key until the appropriate option highlights, then press the OK soft key.

If you select Automatic, you are connected to the first available network when roaming.

If you select Manual, the phone scans for the available networks. Go to Step 3.
3. Press the Up or Down key until the network you want highlights and then press the OK soft key.

You are connected to that network.

## Caller ID

You can prevent your phone number from being displayed on the phone of the person being called.

Note: Some networks do not allow you to change this setting.
The following options are available:
Default: the default setting provided by the network is used.
Hide Number: your number does not display on the other person's phone.
Send Number: your number is sent each time you make a call.

## Closed User Group (CUG)

This network service allows incoming and outgoing calls to be restricted to a selected user group. You can create up to ten user groups.
For details on how to create and use a closed user group, contact your service provider.

Example: A company lends SIM cards to its employees and wants to restrict outgoing calls to members of the same team.

## Activating a Closed User Group

If you select the Closed User Group menu, you can enter the CUG function. You can now access the following options after pressing the Select soft key:
Index List: lets you list, add or delete CUG index numbers. The list of current CUG indexes appears. Add a new CUG index as advised by your service provider or delete a selected group.

## Camera

Using the camera module built in your phone, you can take pictures of people or events while on the move.
Additionally, you can send photos to other people in a picture message or as an e-mail attachment. The camera produces JPEG pictures.

- Do not take photos of people without their permission.
- Do not take photos in a place where cameras are not allowed.
- Do not take Photos in a place where you may interfere with another person's privacy.


## Take Photos

This menu allows you to take a picture to send the photo as a picture message to other destinations.

Your phone is equipped with a WAP (Wireless Application Protocol) browser to allow you to access and navigate the Wireless Web using your phone.

## Home

Selecting this menu connects the phone to the network and loads the homepage of the Wireless Web service provider. You can also press the $\underset{\sim}{\bullet}$ key in Idle mode. The content of the WAP Browser startup homepage depends on your Wireless Web service provider. To scroll through the screen, use the Up and Down keys.

Note: To access the startup homepage from any other screen in the WAP Browser, use the Home option.

## Exiting the WAP Browser

To exit the browser at any time, simply press the $\mathbf{m}_{\mathbb{C}}$ key or press and hold the $\underset{\mathcal{\sim}}{\boldsymbol{\sim}}$ key.

## Settings

This option allows you to set up five proxy servers for the WAP browser. Contact your service provider for details. For each server, the following options are available: Profile Name: enter a name that you wish to assign to the HTTP proxy server.
Homepage URL: set the address of your startup homepage. When the default homepage displays, you can delete it using the [c) key and enter your own choice. Security: set the data transmission mode. Choose Secure to protect your data against unauthorized access; otherwise, choose Non-Secure.

Bearer: select the bearer to be used for each type of network address accessed: GPRS or Data. The remaining options depend on the Bearer setting.
When the bearer is set to GPRS
User Name: enter the User ID required to connect to the GPRS network.
Password: enter the password required to connect to the GPRS network.

1. APN: enter the access point name used for the address of the GPRS network gateway.
When the bearer is set to Data
Login Name: enter the PPP server login ID.
Password: enter the PPP server password.
Dial-up Number: enter the PPP server phone number. Data Call Type: select a data call type: Analog or ISDN. IP Address: enter the WAP gateway address required to connect to the Internet.

Note: The WAP Browser settings may vary, depending on the service provider. Contact your service provider for further information.

## Clear Cache

You can clear the information stored in the cache, which is the phone's temporary memory which stores the most recently accessed Web pages.
Press the Yes soft key to confirm the deletion. Otherwise, press the No soft key or the $\underset{\chi}{ }$ key.

## Games

The Games menu lists games delivered with your phone and the option to shop for more games using the WAP

Browser. Use the Up and Down keys to your selection and press the Select soft key or the $\underset{\mathcal{X}}{\mathbf{~}}$ key.

## Audio

Use the Audio menu to launch the WAP Browser to download additional ringtones. Use the Up and Down keys to your selection and press the Select soft key or the < key.

## Graphics

The Graphics menu provides the option to launch the WAP Browser to download additional graphics and photos. Use the Up and Down keys to your selection and press the Select soft key or the $\boldsymbol{\mathcal { X }}$ key.

## Delete All

This menu allows you to delete all of the downloaded items in the Games, Audio or Graphics folders. You can delete all of the items at one time.

## Display Settings

You can change the background image, the display style for Menu mode, lighting preferences and front LCD
settings according to your preference.

## Wallpaper

This option allows you to change the background image to be displayed in Idle mode.
To change the background image:

1. Use the Up or Down navigation key to highlight the wallpaper list. Press the Select soft key or the $\underset{\chi}{ }$ key.
2. Use the Up or Down key to select the image you want. Press the Select soft key or the $\chi$ key.
You have various preset images available. You can also select the blank background or any downloaded images.
3. When the image displays, press the Select soft key.
4. To display the time and date, you must enable the Text Display option.

## Front LCD

This menu allows you to adapt the color of external display to your preference.

## Menu Style

This menu allows you to select the menu display style. You can choose Grid, Bar, or Page Style.

## Shop Graphics

This option opens the WAP browser to a web site where you can download additional graphics.

## Back Light

You can select a set amount of time for your back light to display.
To select the length of time for which the backlight is on, use the Up and Down keys to highlight the desired time and press the Select soft key.

## Service Light

This menu allows you to select whether or not the service light is used or in which color it flashes.
Select one from the 7 color combinations. The service light flashes in the appropriate color.
If you do not want to use the service light, select Off.

## Graphic Logo

This menu allows you to display your service provider's logo instead of its name.
Off: the service provider's name displays in Idle mode.
On: the service provider's logo displays in Idle mode; if no logo has been stored, the service provider's name displays.

## Greeting Message

The Security feature enables you to restrict the use of your phone to the people and the types of calls of your choice Various codes and passwords are used to protect the features of your phone. They are described in the following sections.

Note: Depending on your country, service provider, or the software version of the phone, the Automatic option may not display.

## PIN Check

When the PIN Check feature is enabled, you must enter your PIN each time you switch the phone on.
Consequently, any person who does not have your PIN cannot use your phone without your approval.

Note: Before disabling the PIN Check feature, you must enter your PIN.
The following options are available:
Disable: the phone connects directly to the network when you switch it on.
Enable: you must enter the PIN each time the phone is switched on.

## Change PIN

This feature allows you to change your current PIN, provided that the PIN Check feature is enabled. You must enter the current PIN before you can specify a new one. Once you have entered a new PIN, you are asked to confirm it by entering it again.

## Phone Lock

## FDN Mode

FDN (Fixed Dial Number) mode, if supported by your SIM card, allows you to restrict your outgoing calls to a limited set of phone numbers.
The following options are available:
Disable: you can phone any number.
Enable: you can only call phone numbers stored in Phonebook. You must enter your PIN2.

Note: Not all SIM cards have a PIN2. If your SIM card does not, this menu does not display.

## Change PIN2

The Change PIN2 feature allows you to change your current PIN2 to a new one. You must enter the current PIN2 before you can specify a new one. Once you have entered a new PIN2, you are asked to confirm it by entering it again.

Anykey Answer: when this option is checked, you can answer an incoming call by pressing any key, except the (2/® key and the Reject soft key. To reject the call, press the $\quad$ © $\mathbb{C}$ key or the Reject soft key.
When this option is unchecked, you can only press the $\Omega$ key or Accept soft key.

## Short Cut

The Navigation keys can be used as shortcut keys. In Idle mode, they allow you to access specific menus directly.

## Solving Problems

If you are experiencing problems with your phone, perform the following simple checks before contacting a service professional. This may save you the time and expense of an unnecessary service call.

## When you switch your phone on, the following messages

 may appear
## Insert SIM Card

- Check that the SIM card is correctly installed.


## Phone Locked Enter Password

- The automatic locking function has been enabled. You must enter the phone's password before you can use the phone.


## Enter PIN

- You are using your phone for the first time. You must enter the Personal Identification Number supplied with the SIM card.
- The PIN Check feature is enabled. Every time the phone is switched on, the PIN has to be entered. To disable this feature, use the PIN Check menu.


## Enter PUK

- The PIN code was entered incorrectly three times in succession and the phone is now blocked. Enter the PUK supplied by your service provider.


## "No service," "Network failure" or "Not done" displays

- The network connection was lost. You may be in a weak signal area (in a tunnel or surrounded by buildings). Move and try again.
- You are trying to access an option for which you have not taken out a subscription with your service provider. Contact the service provider for further details.


## You have entered a number but it was not dialed

$\bullet$ Have you pressed the $\sim$ key?

- Are you accessing the right cellular network?
- You may have set an outgoing call barring option.


## Your correspondent cannot reach you

$\star$ Is your phone switched on (the $\boldsymbol{\sim} \mathbb{C}$ key pressed for more than one second)?

- Are you accessing the right cellular network?
- You may have set an incoming call barring option.


## Your correspondent cannot hear you speaking

- Have you switched off the microphone?
- Are you holding the phone close enough to your mouth? The microphone is located at the bottom of the phone.

The phone starts beeping and "**Warning** Low Battery" flashes on the display

- The battery is insufficiently charged. Recharge the battery.


## The audio quality of the call is poor

Check the signal strength indicator on the display
(T.ull); the number of bars indicates the signal strength from strong (T.ulll) to weak ( $\mathrm{T}_{1}$ ).

- Try moving the phone slightly or moving closer to a window if you are in a building.


## No number is dialed when you recall a Phonebook entry

Check that the number has been stored correctly, by using the Phonebook Search feature.
$\bullet$ Re-store the number, if necessary.

If the above guidelines do not help you to
solve the problem, take a note of:

- the model and serial numbers of your phone
- your warranty details
- a clear description of the problem

Then contact your local dealer or Samsung aftersales service.

## Access Codes

There are several access codes that are used by your phone and its' SIM card. These codes help you protect the phone against unauthorized use.
When requested for any of the codes explained below, enter the appropriate code (displayed as asterisks) and press the OK soft key or the $\underset{\chi}{ }$ key. If you make a mistake, press the key until the incorrect digit is cleared and then continue entering the correct code.
The access codes, except for the PUK and PUK2 codes can be changed using the Security menu. See "Security" on page 152 for further details.
Important! Avoid using access codes resembling emergency numbers, such as 911, to prevent accidental dialing of an emergency number.

## Phone Password

## PUK

The 8-digit PUK (PIN Unblocking Key) is required to change a disabled PIN. The PUK may be supplied with the SIM card. If not, contact your service provider.
To re-enable your PIN:

1. Enter the PUK and press the OK soft key or the $\ddot{\chi}$ key.
2. Enter a PIN of your choice and press the OK soft key or the X key.
3. When the Confirm New PIN message displays, enter the same code again and press the OK soft key or the $\dot{\chi}$ key.
When you enter an incorrect PUK ten times in succession, the SIM card becomes invalid. Contact your service provider for a new card.

## PIN2

The PIN2 (4 to 8 digits), supplied with some SIM cards, is required to access specific functions, such as setting the maximum cost of a call. These functions are available if supported by your SIM card.
If you enter an incorrect PIN2 three times in succession, the code is disabled and you cannot access the functions until you re-enable it by entering the PUK2.

## PUK2

The 8-digit PUK2 (PIN Unblocking Key 2), supplied with some SIM cards, is required to change a disabled PIN2. If you lose the code, contact your service provider.
To re-enable your PIN2:

1. Enter the PUK2 and press the OK soft key or the $\underset{\chi}{ }$ key.
2. Enter a new PIN2 of your choice and press the OK soft key or the $\chi$ key.
3. When the Confirm PIN2 message displays, enter the same code again and press the OK soft key.

When you enter an incorrect PUK2 ten times in succession, you are not able to access the functions requiring the PIN2. Contact your service provider for a new card.

## Exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) Signals

Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the emission limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on the safety standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and through evaluation of scientific studies.
The standards include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age and health.
The exposure standard for wireless phones employs a unit of measurement known as Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR limit recommended by the FCC is $1.6 \mathrm{~W} / \mathrm{kg} .{ }^{1}$
SAR tests are conducted using standard operating positions specified by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone

1. In the U.S. and Canada, the SAR limit for mobile phones used by the public is $1.6 \mathrm{watts} / \mathrm{kg}(\mathrm{W} / \mathrm{kg})$ averaged over one gram of tissue. The standard incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection for the public and to account for any variations in measurements.
while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output of the phone.
Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the limit established by the governmentadopted requirement for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC for each model. While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the government requirement.
The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this model phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF exposure guidelines. ## Precautions When Using Batteries

- Never use any charger or battery that is damaged in any way.
- Use the battery only for its intended purpose.
- If you use the phone near the network's base station, it uses less power; talk and standby time are greatly affected by the signal strength on the cellular network and the parameters set by the network operator.
- Battery charging time depends on the remaining battery charge and the type of battery and charger used. The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of times, but it will gradually wear out. When the operation time (talk time and standby time) is noticeably shorter than normal, it is time to buy a new battery.
- If left unused, a fully charged battery will discharge itself over time.
- Use only Samsung-approved batteries and recharge your battery only with Samsung-approved chargers. When a charger is not in use, disconnect it from the power source. Do not leave the battery connected to a charger for more than a week, since overcharging may shorten its life.
- Extreme temperatures will affect the charging capacity of your battery: it may require cooling or warming first.
- Do not leave the battery in hot or cold places, such as in a car in summer or winter conditions, as you will reduce the capacity and lifetime of the battery. Always try to keep the battery at room temperature. A phone with a hot or cold battery may temporarily not work, even when the battery is fully charged. Li-ion batteries are particularly affected by temperatures below $0{ }^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ ( $32^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ ).

Health and Safety Information

- Do not short-circuit the battery. Accidental shortcircuiting can occur when a metallic object (coin, clip or pen) causes a direct connection between the + and - terminals of the battery (metal strips on the battery), for example when you carry a spare battery in a pocket or bag. Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the object causing the shortcircuiting.
- Dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations. Always recycle. Do not dispose of batteries in a fire.


## Road Safety

Your wireless phone gives you the powerful ability to communicate by voice, almost anywhere, anytime. But an important responsibility accompanies the benefits of wireless phones, one that every user must uphold. When driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. When using your wireless phone behind the wheel of a car, practice good common sense and remember the following tips:

1. Get to know your wireless phone and its features, such as speed dial and redial. If available, these features help you to place your call without taking your attention off the road.
2. When available, use a hands-free device. If possible, add an extra layer of convenience and safety to your wireless phone with one of the many hands-free accessories available today.
3. Position your wireless phone within easy reach. Be able to access your wireless phone without removing your eyes from the road. If you get an incoming call at an inconvenient time, let your voice mail answer it for you.
4. Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow, ice and even heavy traffic can be hazardous.
5. Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. Jotting down a To Do list or flipping through your phonebook takes your attention away from your primary responsibility, driving safely.
6. Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when you are not moving or before pulling into traffic. Try to plan calls when your car will be stationary. If you need to make a call while moving, dial only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, then continue.
7. Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Make the people with whom you are talking aware that you are driving and suspend conversations that have the potential to divert your attention from the road.
8. Use your wireless phone to call for help. Dial the emergency number in the case of fire, traffic accident or medical emergencies. Remember, it is a free call on your wireless phone!
9. Use your wireless phone to help others in emergencies. If you see a car accident, crime in progress or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call the emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.
10. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured, or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or any other special non-emergency wireless number.

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## Operating Environment

Remember to follow any special regulations in force in any area and always switch your phone off whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference or danger.
When connecting the phone or any accessory to another device, read its user's guide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect incompatible products. As with other mobile radio transmitting equipment, users are advised that for the satisfactory operation of the equipment and for the safety of personnel, it is recommended that the equipment should only be used in the normal operating position (held to your ear with the antenna pointing over your shoulder).

## Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless phone. Consult the manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

## Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum distance of 15 cm ( 6 inches) be maintained between a wireless phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker. These recommendations are consistent with the independent research and recommendations of Wireless Technology Research. Persons with pacemakers:

* should always keep the phone more than 15 cm ( 6 inches) from their pacemaker when the phone is switched on.
should not carry the phone in a breast pocket.
- should use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize potential interference.
If you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place, switch your phone off immediately.


## Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may wish to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

## Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information. Switch your phone off in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

## Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle.
You should also consult the manufacturer of any
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equipment that has been added to your vehicle. You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

## Posted Facilities

Switch your phone off in any facility where posted notices require you to do so.

## Potentially Explosive Environments

Switch your phone off when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.
Users are advised to switch the phone off while at a refueling point (service station). Users are reminded of the need to observe restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots (fuel storage and distribution areas), chemical plants or where blasting operations are in progress.
Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often but not always clearly marked. They include below deck on boats, chemical transfer or storage facilities, vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane), areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust or metal powders, and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine.

## Emergency Calls

This phone, like any wireless phone, operates using radio signals, wireless and landline networks as well as userprogrammed functions, which cannot guarantee
connection in all conditions. Therefore, you should never rely solely on any wireless phone for essential communications (medical emergencies, for example). Remember, to make or receive any calls the phone must be switched on and in a service area with adequate signal strength. Emergency calls may not be possible on all wireless phone networks or when certain network services and/or phone features are in use. Check with local service providers.
To make an emergency call:

1. If the phone is not on, switch it on.
2. Key in the emergency number for your present location (for example, 911 or other official emergency number).
Emergency numbers vary by location.
3. Press the $\simeq$ key.

If certain features are in use (call barring, for example), you may first need to deactivate those features before you can make an emergency call. Consult this document and your local cellular service provider.
When making an emergency call, remember to give all the necessary information as accurately as possible.
Remember that your phone may be the only means of communication at the scene of an accident; do not cut off the call until given permission to do so.

## Other Important Safety Information

- Only qualified personnel should service the phone or install the phone in a vehicle. Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty applicable to the device.

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- Check regularly that all wireless phone equipment in your vehicle is mounted and operating properly.
- Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases or explosive materials in the same compartment as the phone, its parts or accessories.
- For vehicles equipped with an air bag, remember that an air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, including both installed or portable wireless equipment in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.
-Switch your phone off before boarding an aircraft. The use of wireless phones in aircraft is illegal and may be dangerous to the aircraft's operation.
$\checkmark$ Failure to observe these instructions may lead to the suspension or denial of telephone services to the offender, or legal action, or both.


## Care and Maintenance

Your phone is a product of superior design and craftsmanship and should be treated with care. The suggestions below will help you fulfill any warranty obligations and allow you to enjoy this product for many years

- Keep the phone and all its parts and accessories out of the reach of small children's.
- Keep the phone dry. Precipitation, humidity and liquids contain minerals that will corrode electronic circuits.
- Do not use the phone with a wet hand. Doing so may cause an electric shock to you or damage to the phone.
- Do not use or store the phone in dusty, dirty areas, as its moving parts may be damaged.
- Do not store the phone in hot areas. High temperatures can shorten the life of electronic devices, damage batteries, and warp or melt certain plastics.
- Do not store the phone in cold areas. When the phone warms up to its normal operating temperature, moisture can form inside the phone, which may damage the phone's electronic circuit boards.
- Do not drop, knock or shake the phone. Rough handling can break internal circuit boards.

## Appendix A: CERTIFICATION INFORMATION (SAR)

It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the emission limits for exposure to radio frequency(RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission of the U.S. Government. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on safety standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR limit set by the FCC is 1.6 W/kg. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

Before a new model phone is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the limit established by the governmentadopted requirement for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations(e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC for each model. The highest SAR values for this model phone as reported to the FCC are Head: $1.37 \mathrm{~W} / \mathrm{Kg}$, Body-worn: $0.689 \mathrm{~W} / \mathrm{Kg}$. Body-worn operations are restricted to Samsung-supplied, approved or none Samsung designated accessories that have no metal and must provide at least 1.5 cm separation between the device, including its antenna whether extended or retracted, and the user's body. It requires obeying all traffic signs and signals and staying within the speed limit.

Appendix B: Guide to Safe and Responsible Wireless Phone Use

It means using seat belts and requiring other passengers to do the same.
But with wireless phone use, driving safely means a little more. This brochure is a call to wireless phone users everywhere to make safety their first priority when behind the wheel of a car. Wireless telecommunications is keeping us in touch, simplifying our lives, protecting us in emergencies and providing opportunities to help others in need. When it comes to the use of wireless phones, safety is your most important call.

## Wireless Phone "Safety Tips"

Below are safety tips to follow while driving and using a wireless phone which should be easy to remember:

1. Get to know your wireless phone and its features such as speed dial and redial. Carefully read your instruction manual and learn to take advantage of valuable features most phones offer, including automatic redial and memory. Also, work to memorize the phone keypad so you can use the speed dial function without taking your attention off the road.
2. When available, use a hands free device. A number of hands free wireless phone accessories are readily available today. Whether you choose an installed mounted device for your wireless phone or a speaker phone accessory, take advantage of these devices if available to you.
3. Position your wireless phone within easy reach. Make sure you place your wireless phone within easy reach and where you can grab it without removing your eyes from the road. If you get an incoming call at an inconvenient time, if possible, let your voice mail answer it for you.
4. Suspend conversations during hazardous driving conditions or situations. Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or

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hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow and ice can be hazardous, but so is heavy traffic. As a driver, your first responsibility is to pay attention to the road.
5. Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. If you are reading an address book or business card, or writing a "to do" list while driving a car, you are not watching where you are going. It's common sense. Don't get caught in a dangerous situation because you are reading or writing and not paying attention to the road or nearby vehicles.
6. Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when you are not moving or before pulling into traffic. Try to plan your calls before you begin your trip or attempt to coincide your calls with times you may be stopped at a stop sign, red light or otherwise stationary. But if you need to dial while driving, follow this simple tip-dial only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, then continue.
7. Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Stressful or emotional conversations and driving do not mix-they are distracting and even dangerous when you are behind the wheel of a car. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and if necessary, suspend conversations which have the potential to divert your attention from the road.
8. Use your wireless phone to call for help. Your wireless phone is one of the greatest tools you can own to protect yourself and your family in dangerous situations-with your phone at your side, help is only three numbers away. Dial 9-1-1 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic accident, road hazard or medical emergency. Remember, it is a free call on your wireless phone!
9. Use your wireless phone to help others in emergencies. Your wireless phone provides you a perfect opportunity to be a
"Good Samaritan" in your community. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 9-1-1 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.
10. Call roadside assistance or a special wireless non-emergency assistance number when necessary. Certain situations you encounter while driving may require attention, but are not urgent enough to merit a call for emergency services. But you still can use your wireless phone to lend a hand. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency wireless number.

Careless, distracted individuals and people driving irresponsibly represent a hazard to everyone on the road. Since 1984, the Cellular Telecommunications Industry Association and the wireless industry have conducted educational outreach to inform wireless phone users of their responsibilities as safe drivers and good citizens. ## Appendix C: Consumer Update on Wireless Phones

## U.S. Food and Drug Administration

1. What kinds of phones are the subject of this update?

The term wireless phone refers here to hand-held wireless phones with built-in antennas, often called cell, mobile, or PCS phones. These types of wireless phones can expose the user to measurable radio frequency energy (RF) because of the short distance between the phone and the user s head. These RF exposures are limited by Federal Communications Commission safety guidelines that were developed with the advice of FDA and other federal health and safety agencies. When the phone is located at greater distances from the user, the exposure to RF is drastically lower because a person's RF exposure decreases rapidly with increasing distance from the source. The so-called "cordless phones," which have a base unit connected to the telephone wiring in a house, typically operate at far lower power levels, and thus produce RF exposures well within the FCC's compliance limits.
2. Do wireless phones pose a health hazard?

The available scientific evidence does not show that any health problems are associated with using wireless phones. There is no proof, however, that wireless phones are absolutely safe. Wireless phones emit low levels of radio frequency energy (RF) in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of RF when in the stand-by mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low

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level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects. Many studies of low level RF exposures have not found any biological effects. Some studies have suggested that some biological effects may occur, but such findings have not been confirmed by additional research. In some cases, other researchers have had difficulty in reproducing those studies, or in determining the reasons for inconsistent results.
3. What is FDA's role concerning the safety of wireless phones?

Under the law, FDA does not review the safety of radiation-emitting consumer products such as wireless phones before they can be sold, as it does with new drugs or medical devices. However, the agency has authority to take action if wireless phones are shown to emit radio frequency energy (RF) at a level that is hazardous to the user. In such a case, FDA could require the manufacturers of wireless phones to notify users of the health hazard and to repair, replace or recall the phones so that the hazard no longer exists.
Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regulatory actions, FDA has urged the wireless phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following: Support needed research into possible biological effects of RF of the type emitted by wireless phones;
Design wireless phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user that is not necessary for device function; and Cooperate in providing users of wireless phones with the best possible information on possible effects of wireless phone use on human health FDA belongs to an interagency working group of the federal agencies that have responsibility for different aspects of

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RF safety to ensure coordinated efforts at the federal level.
The following agencies belong to this working group:
National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health
Environmental Protection Agency
Federal Communications Commission
Occupational Safety and Health Administration
National Telecommunications and Information
Administration
The National Institutes of Health participates in some interagency working group activities, as well.
FDA shares regulatory responsibilities for wireless phones with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). All phones that are sold in the United States must comply with FCC safety guidelines that limit RF exposure. FCC relies on FDA and other health agencies for safety questions about wireless phones.
FCC also regulates the base stations that the wireless phone networks rely upon. While these base stations operate at higher power than do the wireless phones themselves, the RF exposures that people get from these base stations are typically thousands of times lower than those they can get from wireless phones. Base stations are thus not the primary subject of the safety questions discussed in this document.

1. What is FDA doing to find out more about the possible health effects of wireless phone RF?
FDA is working with the U.S. National Toxicology Program and with groups of investigators around the world to ensure that high priority animal studies are conducted to address important questions about the effects of exposure to radio frequency energy (RF).
[^1]FDA has been a leading participant in the World Health Organization International Electromagnetic Fields (EMF) Project since its inception in 1996. An influential result of this work has been the development of a detailed agenda of research needs that has driven the establishment of new research programs around the world. The Project has also helped develop a series of public information documents on EMF issues.
FDA and the Cellular Telecommunications \& Internet Association (CTIA) have a formal Cooperative Research and Development Agreement (CRADA) to do research on wireless phone safety. FDA provides the scientific oversight, obtaining input from experts in government, industry, and academic organizations. CTIA-funded research is conducted through contracts to independent investigators. The initial research will include both laboratory studies and studies of wireless phone users. The CRADA will also include a broad assessment of additional research needs in the context of the latest research developments around the world.
2. What steps can I take to reduce my exposure to radio frequency energy from my wireless phone?
If there is a risk from these products-and at this point we do not know that there is-it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your exposure to radio frequency energy (RF). Since time is a key factor in how much exposure a person receives, reducing the amount of time spent using a wireless phone will reduce RF exposure.

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If you must conduct extended conversations by wireless phone every day, you could place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. For example, you could use a headset and carry the wireless phone away from your body or use a wireless phone connected to a remote antenna
Again, the scientific data do not demonstrate that wireless phones are harmful. But if you are concerned about the RF exposure from these products, you can use measures like those described above to reduce your RF exposure from wireless phone use.
3. What about children using wireless phones?

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless phones, including children and teenagers. If you want to take steps to lower exposure to radio frequency energy (RF), the measures described above would apply to children and teenagers using wireless phones. Reducing the time of wireless phone use and increasing the distance between the user and the RF source will reduce RF exposure.
Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all. For example, the government in the United Kingdom distributed leaflets containing such a recommendation in December 2000. They noted that no evidence exists that using a wireless phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit wireless phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists.

[^2]4. Do hands-free kits for wireless phones reduce risks from exposure to RF emissions?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that hands-free kits reduce risks. Hands-free kits can be used with wireless phones for convenience and comfort. These systems reduce the absorption of RF energy in the head because the phone, which is the source of the RF emissions, will not be placed against the head. On the other hand, if the phone is mounted against the waist or other part of the body during use, then that part of the body will absorb more RF energy. Wireless phones marketed in the U.S. are required to meet safety requirements regardless of whether they are used against the head or against the body. Either configuration should result in compliance with the safety limit.
5. Do wireless phone accessories that claim to shield the head from RF radiation work?

Since there are no known risks from exposure to RF emissions from wireless phones, there is no reason to believe that accessories that claim to shield the head from those emissions reduce risks. Some products that claim to shield the user from RF absorption use special phone cases, while others involve nothing more than a metallic accessory attached to the phone. Studies have shown that these products generally do not work as advertised. Unlike "hand-free" kits, these so-called "shields" may interfere with proper operation of the phone. The phone may be forced to boost its power to compensate, leading to an increase in RF absorption. In February 2002, the Federal trade Commission (FTC) charged two companies that sold

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devices that claimed to protect wireless phone users from radiation with making false and unsubstantiated claims. According to FTC, these defendants lacked a reasonable basis to substantiate their claim.
6. What about wireless phone interference with medical equipment?

Radio frequency energy (RF) from wireless phones can interact with some electronic devices. For this reason, FDA helped develop a detailed test method to measure electromagnetic interference (EMI) of implanted cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators from wireless telephones. This test method is now part of a standard sponsored by the Association for the Advancement of Medical instrumentation (AAMI). The final draft, a joint effort by FDA, medical device manufacturers, and many other groups, was completed in late 2000. This standard will allow manufacturers to ensure that cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators are safe from wireless phone EMI. FDA has tested hearing aids for interference from handheld wireless phones and helped develop a voluntary standard sponsored by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE). This standard specifies test methods and performance requirements for hearing aids and wireless phones so that no interference occurs when a person uses a compatible phone and a compatible hearing aid at the
same time. This standard was approved by the IEEE in 2000.

FDA continues to monitor the use of wireless phones for possible interactions with other medical devices. Should harmful interference be found to occur, FDA will conduct testing to assess the interference and work to resolve the problem.
7. What are the results of the research done already?

The research done thus far has produced conflicting results, and many studies have suffered from flaws in their research methods. Animal experiments investigating the effects of radiofrequency energy (RF) exposures characteristic of wireless phones have yielded conflicting results that often cannot be repeated in other laboratories.
A few animal studies, however, have suggested that low levels of RF could accelerate the development of cancer in laboratory animals. However, many of the studies that showed increased tumor development used animals that had been genetically engineered or treated with cancercausing chemicals so as to be pre-disposed to develop cancer in the absence of RF exposure. Other studies exposed the animals to RF for up to 22 hours per day. These conditions are not similar to the conditions under which people use wireless phones, so we don $t$ know with certainty what the results of such studies mean for human health.
Three large epidemiology studies have been published since December 2000. Between them, the studies investigated any possible association between the use of wireless phones and primary brain cancer, gioma, meningioma, or acoustic neuroma, tumors of the brain or

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salivary gland, leukemia, or other cancers. None of the studies demonstrated the existence of any harmful health effects from wireless phone RF exposures. However, none of the studies can answer questions about long-term exposures, since the average period of phone use in these studies was around three years.
8. What research is needed to decide whether RF exposure from wireless phones poses a health risk?

A combination of laboratory studies and epidemiological studies of people actually using wireless phones would provide some of the data that are needed. Lifetime animal exposure studies could be completed in a few years. However, very large numbers of animals would be needed to provide reliable proof of a cancer promoting effect if one exists. Epidemiological studies can provide data that is directly applicable to human populations, but 10 or more years follow-up may be needed to provide answers about some health effects, such as cancer. This is because the interval between the time of exposure to a cancer-causing agent and the time tumors develop - if they do - may be many, many years. The interpretation of epidemiological studies is hampered by difficulties in measuring actual RF exposure during day-to-day use of wireless phones. Many factors affect this measurement, such as the angle at which the phone is held, or which model of phone is used.

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## Glossary

To help you understand the main technical terms and abbreviations used in this booklet and take full advantage of the features on your mobile phone, here are a few definitions.

## Active Folder

Ability to answer a call simply by opening the phone.

## Call Forwarding

Ability to reroute calls to another number.

## Call Holding

Ability to put one call on standby while answering or making another call; you can then switch between the two calls, as required.

## Call Waiting

Ability to inform users that they have an incoming call when engaged on another call.
Caller Line Identification Services (Caller ID)
Services allowing subscribers to view or block the telephone numbers of callers.

## Dual Band

Ability to operate with both DCS ( 1900 MHz ) and GSM (850 MHz ) networks. The phone automatically uses the network with strongest signal and even switches networks during a call within the same operator's network.

## EMS (Enhanced Message Service)

An adaptation of the Short Message Service (SMS) that allows you to send and receive ring tones and service provider's logo, as well as combinations of simple media to and from EMScompliant handsets. Because EMS is based on SMS, it can use SMS centres the same way that SMS does. EMS works on all Global System for Mobile communications (GSM) networks. EMS senders can use text, melodies, pictures, sounds, and animations to enhance the expressive power of messages that are limited by the display constraints of mobile devices.

GSM (Global System for Mobile Communication)
International standard for cellular communication, guaranteeing compatibility between the various network operators. GSM covers most European countries and many other parts of the world.

## Java

Programming language generating applications that can run on all hardware platforms, whether small, medium or large, without modification. It has been promoted for and geared heavily to the Web, both for public Web sites and Intranets. When a Java program runs from a Web page, it is called a Java applet. When it is run on a mobile phone or pager, it is called a MIDlet.

## MMS (Multimedia Message Service)

A message service for the mobile environment, standardized by the WAP Forum and the 3rd Generation Partnership Program (3GPP). For phone users, MMS is a message service that provides delivery of user-created content from phone to phone. The message addressing used is primarily phone numbers, thus traffic goes from phone to phone. MMS also provides support for e-mail addressing, so that messages can be sent by e-mail. In addition to the text content of SMS, MMS messages can contain still images, voice or audio clips, and also video clips and presentation information.

Glossary

## Multi-party Calling

Ability to establish a conference call involving up to five additional parties.

## Phone Password

Security code used to unlock the phone when you have selected the option to lock it automatically each time it switches on.

## PIN (Personal Identification Number)

Security code that protects the phone/SIM against unauthorized use. The PIN is supplied by the service provider with the SIM card. It may be a four to eight-digit number and can be changed, as required.

## Proxy Server

A server that resides between a web client, such as a web browser, and a real Web server and acts as an intermediary between them. When some people browse a web site, their browser is not actually connecting to the web server. The request from their browser goes to a proxy server, and the proxy server makes the request to the web server.
A proxy server can improve performance for groups of users because it cache the results of all requests for a certain amount of time. If a user requests a web page that it already fetched for another user, it returns the page instead of forwarding the request to the Web server, which can be a time-consuming operation.

## PUK (PIN Unblocking Key)

Security code that protects the phone/SIM against unauthorized use. The PIN is supplied by the service provider with the SIM card. It may be a four to eight-digit number and can be changed, as required.

## Roaming

Use of your phone when you are outside your home area (when traveling for example).

## SIM (Subscriber Identification Module)

Card containing a chip with all the information required to operate the phone (network and memory information, as well as the subscriber's personal data). The SIM card fits into a small slot on the back of the phone and is protected by the battery.

## SMS (Short Message Service)

Network service sending and receiving messages to and from another subscriber without having to speak to the correspondent. The message created or received can be displayed, received, edited or sent.

## Soft Keys

Two keys marked $\square$ and $\because$ on the phone, the purpose of which:

- varies according to the function that you are currently using
- is indicated on the bottom line of the display just above the corresponding key.


## Voice Mail

Computerized answering service that automatically answers your calls when you are not available, plays a greeting (optionally in your own voice) and records a message.
